Since the retirement of Justice Jay Rabinowitz more than 10 years ago, there has not been a sitting supreme court justice in Fairbanks. In January 2008 Justice Daniel Winfree began serving in Fairbanks as a supreme court justice taking the place of retired Justice Alexander Bryner. The employees that supported retired Justice Bryner were Anchorage-based positions. Unlike Fairbanks, Anchorage does not have a geographic differential added to the base salary amounts paid employees. The court system is seeking additional funding to cover the increased personal services expenses for appellate court staff that will now be serving in Fairbanks. This annual cost will be \$33,400.

The justices from Juneau and Fairbanks require administrative assistance while they are working in Anchorage. In the past, supporting the Juneau justice was accomplished through a coordinated effort and distribution of the additional work among the clerical staff supporting the Anchorage-based justices. With the appointment of a Fairbanks-based justice, the need for extra administrative support required has now doubled, although the number of Anchorage-based judicial assistants has been reduced by one. When a justice is not in his or her home chambers, that justice cannot produce work without the assistance of local staff. This includes circulating new draft opinions, circulating voting memos, and proofreading opinions for publication. Additionally, with the

The second district requests \$256,700 for three permanent full-time positions. Each position is described below.

Nome trial courts requests \$95,000 for a permanent full-time rural court training assistant. The second district is currently the only district without a rural court trainer position. Although the second district has fewer clerical staff than the other districts, it has proportionally higher turnover in clerical positions. technical, and clerical assistance to rural courts in program areas such as case processing, fiscal procedures, personnel management, customer service, and general court management. The position will travel regularly to rural courts to assess compliance with court system rules, policies and procedures and will serve as rural clerk of court or deputy magistrate during clerical vacancies or extended staff absences.

The Kotzebue and Barrow superior courts are clerically staffed with one clerk of court and four deputy clerks. Due to the minimal number of staff within these courts, adequate staffing is not always available to address both the in-court and "front counter" customer service needs of these courts. These two courts are also plagued with excessive vacancies and high turnover rates. These conditions further negatively impact the staffing issues within the second district courts. Kotzebue and Barrow courts are each seeking an additional permanent full-time deputy court clerk. This clerk position will manage telephone communications, jury coordination and walk-in customers, who are there to make payments, file cases, obtain forms and ask a myriad of questions. Customer service is severely impacted by the limited number of staffing within the clerk's office. Following is court-specific case filing information that has impacted the operations of these second district courts:

Kotzebue trial court's superior court case filings are up 38% and district court case filings are up 29% from FY04 to FY05. This position and related expenses will cost approximately \$76,500.

Barrow trial court's superior court felony case filings are up 53% from FY04 to FY05. Case filings increased by 26% for children's matters and by 32% for domestic relations from FY04 to FY05. This position and related expenses will cost approximately \$85,200.

Third District

The third district requests \$488,500 for eight permanent, full-time positions. Each position is described below.

Dillingham superior court, which is the only superior court that does not have a law clerk, requests a permanent full-time law clerk. Early in this court's history, case loads were small in comparison with other superior court sites and it was decided that a law clerk was not required. This is no longer the case for this court, which in addition to its increased caseload is regularly called upon to cover superior court cases in Unalaska and Naknek. Case fillings totals in FY05 are 42% greater than in FY97 when the Dillingham superior court judicial position was created. Population for this area has increased 22.7% from 1990 to 2000. Criminal case fillings for this court are up 22%, childrens matters' filings are up 61% and domestic relations case fillings are up 22% comparing FY05 case fillings against FY04 case fillings. This position and related expenses is estimated to cost \$71,900.

Palmer trial courts requests three permanent, full-time court clerks. The caseload for the Palmer court has steadily increased. This increase is in line with burgeoning population increases in the region. Comparing the 1990 census data against the 2000 census data, the Borough's population grew by 49.5%. Population growth for the entire state was only 14% during this same period. From April 2000 to July 2004, the Mat-su Borough's population grew by 21.8% compared with the rest of the state, which increased by only 4.5%. Statistically, case load increases are known to be commensurate with population increases like those seen in the Mat-Su Borough. Case filings are up 62% from FY00 to FY05. Additional resources are required to respond to Palmer's dramatic, steady, case load increases, which are up another 19% comparing FY04 and FY05 case filings totals. These

The net amount needed to increase juror pay to \$25/day and eliminate first day juror pay is \$69,000.

Additionally, unlike other jurors throughout the state, Anchorage jurors are required to pay for their parking. In a negotiated agreement with the Municipality of Anchorage, jurors were previously able to park in the municipal garage at a cost of \$2.50/day. Under AS 22.20.037(c), the court system is required to conduct an annual salary survey to ensure that court employees receive salaries that are consistent with salaries paid to the classified and partially exempt state employees in the executive branch. In the early 1990's, the court system did not receive the 3.3% raise that employees in the executive branch received for the cost of living increase and the following year the court employees voted in a union. The union has now been decertified, but the court has been vigilant about reviewing the court's salaries for parity with the executive branch.

The most common compensation concern raised by court employees is the discontinuation of annual merit increases upon reaching "F" step. For FY01, the largest union in the executive branch - the General Government Unit - negotiated a revised salary schedule that added a "G" step between the "F" step and the first longevity step. This new step is calculated at "F" step + 3.75%. Inserting a "G" step allows long-term, knowledgeable employees an opportunity to progress through another salary step prior to reaching the first longevity step. Inserting a "G"

The court system is experiencing difficulty recruiting and retaining qualified in-court staff. These positions are currently viewed as stressful and undesirable jobs, involving long hours with few opportunities for respite, frequent unscheduled overtime, a high pressure environment, and an unrealistic number of courtroom demands. In-court clerks, who are paid at a salary range 12, are responsible for an array of courtroom technology, including digital recording equipment, a computerized case management system, an automated jury management system, complicated telephone systems, assistive devices for the hearing-impaired, and an assortment of audio-visual equipment. Their workload has also been affected by other changes in the courtroom environment, such as the number of orders now routinely entered in criminal cases (orders appointing third party custodians, orders requiring indigent defendants to pay for representation, orders to provide fingerprints and DNA samples, restitution orders, and surcharges). The Juneau superior court has over 1,000 superior court case filings each year and with only two superior court judges, proportionally has the highest caseload per superior court judge in the state. To relieve some of the pressure within the superior court, a part-time master and a part-time custody investigator have been added, but there continues to be insufficient judicial resources to manage the Juneau caseload. As an interim method of addressing this problem, the court system is seeking funding for a magistrate. This addition to district court will enable the district court judge to assist with some caseload in the superior court. While a third superior court judge is needed now and will eventually be requested, the court system is proposing this as a less costly (and less efficient) interim approach.

Clerk of Court, Haines, 10A, permanent, part-time (30 hours)

The Haines court is currently staffed by a full-time magistrate and a seasonal (May - Sept.) clerk. The volume of cases supports the addition of a permanent clerk of court to help manage the caseload. The district requests the clerk of court position be budgeted for 30 hours per week and proposes elimination of the seasonal clerk.

Administrative Assistant, Ketchikan, 12A, permanent, full-time

A part-time custody investigator was funded in FY09, but without administrative support. With increased hours, the administrative assistant for the Ketchikan custody investigator will support both the Juneau and Ketchikan custody investigator. This request is to increase the budgeted hours from 18.75 to 37.5 hours per week.

Deputy Clerk II, Craig, 10A, permanent, full-time

The Craig court is currently staffed with a magistrate III, a clerk of court, a full-time clerk and a part-time clerk. This request is to increase the hours of the part-time clerk to full-time to assist with the management of felonies and other superior court case filings now that the Craig court is a superior court filing site. The superior court judge based in Sitka regularly travels to Craig and the additional clerk hours will be used to support the additional work created by the superior court case activity.

In FY08, the Anchorage District Court was managing a caseload of 1,765 non-traffic filings per judicial officer. This is the highest non-traffic caseload in the state by a large margin, and the caseload is increasing; during the first quarter of FY09, the district court's caseload was up 5% over the number of case filings reported for the first quarter of FY08. In addition, the court system has learned that the Municipality of Anchorage intends to add 33 new positions to its existing police force. Adding these police officers will further increase case filings for the district court. Significantly, while the addition of a district court judge in Anchorage would reduce the ratio of filings per judicial officer, the court would remain the busiest district court in the state.

Deputy Clerk III, Anchorage, 12A, permanent, full-time

A deputy clerk III is required to assist the new district court judge with a variety of in-court duties and to manage an array of courtroom technology, including digital recording equipment, a computerized case management system, an automated jury management system, complicated telephone systems, assistive devices for the hearing-impaired, and an assortment of audio-visual equipment. The in-court clerk is a key position in assuring courtroom proceedings go smoothly.

one-fourth of the funding request and the 2009 legislature appropriated funding for another portion of the project, with the understanding that the court would seek further funding during the 2010 legislative session.

Past appropriations have supported projects in Palmer, Anchorage and Fairbanks resulting in courtroom efficiency through streamlining proceedings. In these locations, a second in-court clerk is now present during high volume proceedings so that case paperwork can be distributed to parties while in the courtroom, and data essential to public safety concerns can be immediately recorded in the court's electronic systems for dissemination throughout the justice system. Judgments, bail conditions, and court orders are available to defendants and attorneys without delay, promoting compliance and eliminating the need for subsequent paper processing and mailing. These improvements are not only a benefit to the court, but also to the other justice agencies and ultimately the Department of Public Safety.

The court system was also able to add new court clerk positions in Kenai, Bethel, and Nome to address serious courtroom understaffing. The new positions help to ensure that no court proceedings are postponed or canceled due to the unavailability of court support staff, and reduce some of the pressure associated with inadequate staffing. The court system also added general clerical positions in Juneau, Naknek, Kotzebue, and Anchorage and was able to increase the hours of a position in Bethel.

For FY11, the court system is requesting the remaining positions needed to complete this initiative. The funding for the eighteen remaining positions will be used to hire additional range 10 clerical positions, range 12 courtroom personnel, and range 14 supervisory positions. The new courtroom positions will ensure that an adequate number of in-courts are available for court proceedings and also improve the court system's ability to train in-court staff. Given the complexity of the job, it currently takes approximately one year for an in-court clerk to be fully trained. The additional range 10 clerical positions will allow understaffed courts to keep up with data entry and distribution of orders and other documents.

Third District

The recent addition of an active, dedicated statewide magistrate trainer has been very beneficial, however, more magistrate training resources are justified for a district the size of the third. Because the majority of the district's magistrates and masters are law-trained judicial officers who rarely perform clerical duties, this training is not an

In the Alaska Court System's FY09, FY10, and FY11 budget requests, funding was sought for the "No Dark Courtrooms" initiative to improve courtroom efficiency around the state. A portion of the funding requested has been appropriated each year with the understanding that the court would seek further funding during subsequent legislative sessions. This initiative is integral to the court system's long-range planning effort.

Past appropriations have supported projects in Palmer, Anchorage and Fairbanks that improved courtroom efficiency by streamlining proceedings. In these locations, a second in-court clerk is now present during high volume proceedings so that case paperwork can be generated and distributed to parties in the courtroom, and data essential to public safety can be recorded in the court's electronic systems, making it immediately accessible throughout the justice system. Judgments, bail conditions, and other court orders are available to defendants and attorneys without delay, promoting compliance and eliminating the need for subsequent paper processing and mailing. These improvements are not only a benefit to the court, but also to corrections, state and local law enforcement, and other justice agencies.

Screening and Assessment -- The FLSHC will review new custody filings and flag those in which neither parent has an attorney. These cases will be screened and assessed to determine if they are candidates for participation in a special docket or other non-trial options as described below.

Special Docket - Cases in which parties need information about the strength of their case will be referred to a special docket at which "unbundled" legal services will be provided free by local attorneys. (Unbundled legal services are limited in scope and time compared to full representation).

Child Custody Mediation - Mediation offers parents an opportunity to create co-parenting plans for their children in a non-adversarial, confidential, informal setting with a trained and experienced neutral mediator. This request is an outgrowth of the success of the mediation services provided through the court system's Child Custody and Visitation Mediation Program (CCVMP) for over 10 years. Over a recent 18-month period, referrals to mediation increased sharply, resulting in a 250 percent increase in costs, an amount not sustainable by the federal grant that funds this program. The court system seeks to leverage grant funds to provide an important continuum of mediation services to parents and maximize court resources. The focus of state funding will be to assist parents in conflict over physical and legal custody issues regarding their children and the initial court filing, prior to a decree.

Mediation is not appropriate in every case and this project will develop referral protocols, including screening for domestic violence for the more than 3,000 annual filings, about 54 percent of which are pre-decree, involving custody disputes in domestic relations cases. The pool of private contract mediators will be expanded and given specialized training. The program will evaluate its outcomes, including the impact of early mediation on later litigation and expects to find that successful mediation of the initial co-parenting plan results in a significant decrease in later contested motions for modifications.

Child in Need of Aid (CINA) Mediation - Funds are needed to expand the CINA mediation program in Juneau. In the past two years, the Juneau court has used the CINA mediation program quite heavily to successfully resolve CINA and CINA-related cases. At this point, the program's proven track record supports changing it from a grant-funded pilot project to a permanent mediation location.

Judicial Settlement Conferences - High-conflict parents with communication issues and differing assessments of their own likelihood of success at trial often can benefit from the more evaluative or directed approach of a judge in a settlement conference setting. These individuals often present difficult management challenges during the pretrial litigation phase and in the adversarial setting of the trial itself.

Early Neutral Evaluation - Some parents are motivated to negotiate their own agreement, but they are stymied by significantly differing notions of the likelihood of prevailing at trial, often because they do not understand the factors that guide the judge's custody decision. These parents can benefit from referral to an experienced custody evaluator who can explain the salient factors, evaluate the particular needs of the children, and help the parents negotiate an agreement that meets those needs.

Like other state agencies, the court system is in need of increased bandwidth, which allows electronic information to traverse the court system's network. As database and web application use increases for court business, the amount of information that travels the network slows and congests, leading to delays during court proceedings and other court processes. Increased bandwidth is required to maintain court business for existing and new bandwidth-intensive applications such as e-filing, case management, video arraignment, video conferencing, electronic document management, disaster recovery, and public access terminals for statewide electronic communications, among others.

Once the court system implements its eCourts (e-filing, document management, fully electronic case file), higher network bandwidth will be integral to its success. The court system is already experiencing network congestion, especially at many of its rural locations. In FY14, the court system received \$350.0 to purchase increased bandwidth. This sum was sufficient to purchase increased bandwidth in some rural locations, including Bethel,

Administration requests \$519,600 for six permanent full-time position. These requests are described below: Two CMS (Case Management System) analysts are needed to support ongoing conversions of courts to CourtView, the software used for case management, to implement CMS-related initiatives, and to maintain CourtView once it is installed. To complete the CourtView implementation, it is estimated that the court will convert six to nine courts annually. Each conversion requires a minimum of three weeks for an aggregate of approximately 27 work weeks annually in the field. The current staffing level is inadequate to sustain courts currently on CourtView as well as courts soon to be on CourtView. These positions will cost approximately \$170,600.

A contracts and leasing manager is needed to manage leases for court space and tenant space, and service contracts for janitorial, snow removal and other building services for the 42 court facilities operated by the court system. Additionally, this position will manage numerous small construction projects related to tenant improvements and maintenance work throughout the year. The majority of this work relates to recurring responsibilities funded with leasing and building maintenance operating budget funds. This position is estimated to cost \$87,500.

This position will be responsible for security management and public relations, employee and judicial officer security, building security, information technology security, and emergency preparedness and planning. The estimated cost of this position is \$124,800.

> An additional shop technician is needed in information services to help support ongoing and new projects using infrastructure technologies supported by technical staff. In 1997 and 2001, the Court asked the Judicial Council to gather information for a performance evaluation ot these judicial officers, many of whom are the sole judicial officers in the locations they serve. The Council surveyed Alaskan attorneys and peace and probation officers and shared the results with the Count. The Court would like the Council to conduct judicial performance surveys about magistrates and masters in FY2007. The Council seeks funding for this project. Requested funds will be used to survey design, editing and transcription (3.0), printing, bulk mail and postage (4.1), hosting of electronic surveys (6.0), and data entry and analysis (18.2).

presiding judge, and are not subject to retention elections like Alaskan judges and justices.

Alaska Administrative Rule of Court 23 permits the Alaska COurt System to assign caseloads to retired judges for a period up to two years. The rule requires the Alaska Judicial Council to evaluate the performance of these judges by surveying menbers of the bar in the judicial districts where the judges have served. An evaluation must be done so that the Court may determine the eligibility of these judges to continue to serve pro tem. The Council has not been provided with any additional funding to conduct these evaluations. The Council anticipates that it will need to evaluate five pro tem judges in FY2007.

The Council requires funding in the amoung of 9.2 for survey design, editing and transcription (.7); printing, bulk mail processing and postage (1.7); hosting of electronic survey (2.5); data entry and analysis (4.3).

Alaska has a long history of cooperation among criminal justice agencies, the legislature and the courts. They have formed criminal justice working groups since the 1970s to develop long-range policies and to resolve shorter-term problems. Because the groups include all branches of government, and often the municipal governments too, they can act together. Problems that the groups have addressed included prison overcrowding, substance abuse issues, disparities for minorities, and sentencing and bail needs. Members of the groups (e.g., the Criminal Justice Planning Agency, the Sentencing Commission, the Criminal Justice Assessment Commission, and the Criminal Justice Council) have included:

- Legislators;
- The Court
- Executive branch agencies, including Law, Corrections, Public Safety, Health and Social Services; the Public Defender Agency and the Office of Public Advocacy
- The Alaska Judicial Council: and
- Municipal governments.

The working groups have been funded by agencies, by appropriations from the legislature, and by federal grants.

The Alaska Judicial Council depends on public involvement to perform its constitutional and statutory duties related to the selection and retention of judges. Until recent years, the Council had relied on a mixture of paid and non-paid advertising to involve and inform the public about these important governmental functions. Since advertising was removed from the Council's budget, it has relied solely on non-paid outreach. While the non-paid methods successfully reach some individuals, the absence of paid advertising has coincided with a dramatic drop off in involvement by members of the general public. Council members thus are deprived of information that could help them in their duties, and members of the public who might have wished to be involved are not heard. The effect that the requested increment would have in each of the Council's areas of responsibility is described below.

Soliciting public input on judicial applicants: The Alaska Judicial Council's longstanding procedures for evaluating applicants for judgeships include participation by members of the public. The most important tool for involving the public is an in-person hearing conducted in the town where the vacancy has occurred. At these hearings, members of the public comment on the qualifications of the applicants, and tell the Council members what qualities or characteristics are important to them for their local judge and what specific problems are facing their local justice system. Although the Council has continued to use non-paid methods of soliciting public input (such as posting notices on the state's on-line system and the Council's web site, issuing press releases, and asking local court staff to post notices in the courthouse and around town), the Council's inability to use paid advertising has depressed public participation in these hearings over the past two years. A portion of the requested increment would be used to publicize the hearing dates and times in local communities.

Soliciting public input on evaluation of judges standing for retention: Public comment is also integral to the Council's retention evaluation process, and it has been the Council's practice to conduct a statewide public hearing for the purpose of receiving public testimony on the performance of judges standing for retention. In 2014, the Council attempted to involve the public in its evaluation of judges standing for retention without paid advertising. Consistent with intent language in HB266, Council staff worked closely with the Legislative Information
