Project Description/Justification:

The Jesse Lee Leadership Residential Charter School will provide high quality education to Alaska's youth in a setting that exists nowhere else in the country. The Jesse Lee Home has an important place in the nation's civil rights history. For 39 years, the home housed and educated displaced Native and non-Native youth alike. This integrated approach to children's housing and education was unique in the nation.

The Jesse Lee Home buildings are national treasures, listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The proposal is to restore the facilities as residential charter leadership school for high school youth. Youth statewide will come to the Jesse Lee Home to study with local day students in Alaska's only residential charter school, learning through competency-based education techniques about the sciences, mathematics, politics, technology and the humanities at the same time as they learn about what makes Alaska work: hands-on skills like plumbing, engine repair and healthcare.

Students will attend a semester and return to their home communities, maintaining their ties to their families and culture. Their learning will be fused with cross-cultural education across ethnicities. regions, and tribes.

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Nationally recognized Professor Paul Ongtooguk and the Malcolm Baldrige award-winning Re-Inventing Schools Coalition www.reinventingschools.org are developing curriculum with the universities, Seward High School, AVTEC, Alaska SeaLife Center, National Park Services, U.S. Forest Service, and Outward Bound.

Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (ANCSA) scholarships will subsidize housing costs; other students will pay privately. State funding for charter schools will cover most educational operating costs and the non-profit will raise funds to supplement charter school activities.
