We are requesting funding from the State Capital Budget. Since 1988 NSHC has operated a 15 bed Long Term Care Facility, Quyanna Care Center (QCC) within the existing hospital. Availability of Long Term Care in the region is essential, as evidenced by the constant waiting list of elders seeking to be admitted.

Our new hospital location is presently two miles away. It would not be feasible to maintain QCC at its current location. If we maintain QCC at the old hospital campus it would result in increased staffing and operational costs for both the QCC and Hospital Programs, as well as overall increased facilities management and utility costs.

The State Legislature agreed to fund the QCC Project, but decided on a phased distribution, with \$7,000,000 appropriated in FY2012 and \$8,445,000 in FY2013. NSHC is requesting an increase of \$544,000 for phased funding, compressed project schedule, remote location and new medical program requirements to complete the 18 Bed Long Term Care Facility (QCC) in FY 2013.

Project Timeline:

2010 complete building pad and concept design, foundation piles purchased
2011 complete final design, installed foundation piles, procure and install structural steel, construction contract awarded.
2012 Complete construction and move to the New Regional Facility.
NSHC must execute Phase II SKW-Eskimo, Inc contract no later than January 16, 2012 to maintain schedule.
SKW-Eskimo, Inc remobilizes and start exterior enclosure on March 26, 2012.

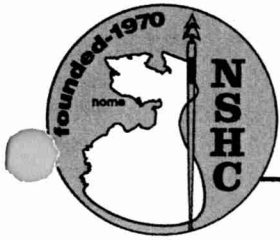

Norton Sound Health Corporation (NSHC) is pleased to provide you with our 2013 Long Term Care and Assisted Living Legislative Priorities. Several meetings have been held with the NSHC Board, the Village Traditional Councils, Village City Councils, and the NSHC Board committees.

As the only health care provider in the Bering Strait Region, we seek the State of Alaska's assistance and support for the Long Term Care Facility and Assisted Living Capital Projects. Your advocacy for our regional priority health needs and issues ensures the health care needs of NSHC are addressed.

NSHC has prioritized the following capital projects for consideration:

PRIORITY 1:

- **LONG TERM CARE FACILITY, Phase II of 2 Year State Funding**

Since 1988, NSHC has operated a 15 bed Long Term Care facility, Quyanna Care Center (QCC), within the existing hospital. In 2009 and 2010 QCC received the Quality Award from Mountain Pacific Health for Alaska Nursing Homes. In 2011 QCC received a national award from Great American Nursing Home. This ranks within the top tier nationwide for consistently exceeding resident expectations as demonstrated by a 5 Star rating from Centers for Medicaid & Medicare Services.

Availability of Long Term Care in the region is essential to maximize the quality of life for our elders living in the Bering Strait Region. The Phase II funding will complete our new 18 bed QCC, when NSHC moves to the New Regional Hospital in 2012. Our accomplishments since 2010 are completing the building pad, purchased and installed foundation piles, the final design and installed the structural steel. With the winter shutdown in November, 2011, SKW-Eskimos, Inc. will remobilize and start up on March 26, 2012.

PRIORITY 2:

- **Assisted Living Facility**

Construct a new 10 unit facility across the street from the new hospital by 2013, which will allow us to move our Elders living in Anchorage, Fairbanks or out of state back to our region. NSHC has constructed and completed a building pad in 2010.

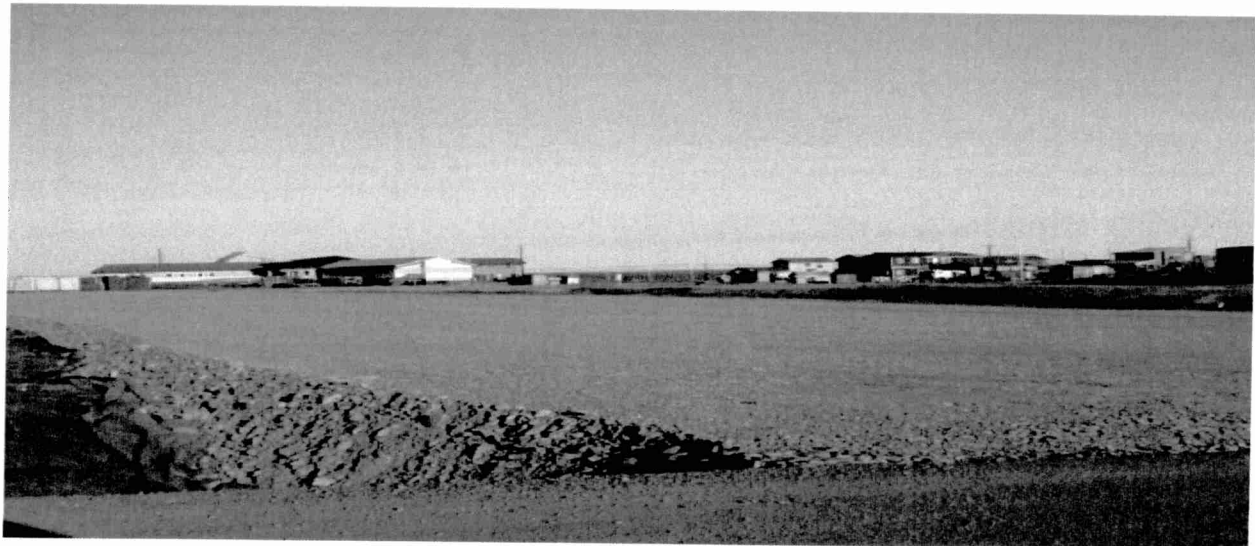

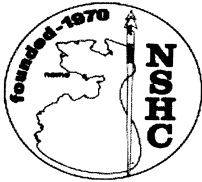

FY 2013 Long Term Care Facility
January 30, 2012**

Norton Sound Health Corporation (NSHC), based in Nome, Alaska, was founded in 1970 to serve the health care needs of the Inupiat, St. Lawrence Yupik, and Yu'pik people of the Bering Strait Region of Northwest Alaska. Each year NSHC negotiates an annual compact with the Indian Health Service (I.H.S.) for its funding levels. The federal government, through the IHS, is constructing a new regional hospital in Nome funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA).

Long Term Care Facility (\$8,445M)

Since 1988, NSHC has operated a 15 bed long term care facility, Quyanna Care Center (QCC), within the existing hospital. QCC continues to maximize the quality of life for residents living in the Bering Strait Region who have made QCC their home. Availability of Long Term Care in the region is essential, as evidenced by the constant waiting list of elders seeking to be admitted to QCC.

Staff makes every effort to maintain a very high level of care by ensuring that patient safety and quality of care comes first. In 2009 and 2010 QCC received the Quality Award from Mountain Pacific Health for Alaska Nursing Homes.

In 2011 QCC received a national award from Great American Nursing Home. This ranks within the top tier nationwide for consistently exceeding resident expectations as demonstrated by a 5 Star rating from Centers for Medicaid & Medicare Services.

It is not feasible to maintain QCC at its current location two miles from the New Regional Hospital without jeopardizing quality of care for elders in the facility. Maintaining the QCC at the old hospital campus would result in increased staffing/operational costs for both the QCC and Hospital programs, as well as overall increased facilities management/utility costs.

The State supports health care in the Bering Strait Region with Public Health Nursing, Medicaid, Behavioral Health, Women – Infants – Children (WIC), Community Health Aide, and other programs. A 2007 study by the Pacific Health Policy Group, commissioned by the Alaska State Legislature, indicated that a statewide shift of long term care services from the private sector to the tribal healthcare system would result in savings of \$36 million over ten years. Through the 100% Federal Medical Assistance Percentages (FMAP) Program at an IHS or tribal facility, the State saves approximately \$1 million per year from the State's general fund for every year a facility is in operation.

Detailed Long Term Care Information

NSHC has completed important milestones with the funding appropriated in 2012. In 2010, the pad for the facility was completed, foundation piles were purchased and the Programming/concept design was completed. Funding for this project is being provided in two separate fiscal years which required that the construction scope and contract be split into two separate phases, which is inherently more complex and less efficient.

The only way to complete the QCC Facility the same time as the New Regional Hospital was to enter into a General Contractor/Construction Manager design assist construction contract in 2011 based on preliminary construction estimates. This model allowed structural steel to be procured, shipped (barging is the only option for Nome), and erected in 2011, prior to completing final design. Final design documents were published in November, 2011 and more precise construction estimates are now in hand based on these documents.

In 2011, the final design was reviewed by the Fire Marshall, foundation piles were put in and completed, construction contract was awarded to SKW-Eskimo, Inc, and building construction started on the steel erection in September, and anticipates 100% design documents by the end of October. With construction started in 2011 and completed in December, 2012 the total cost to design, construct and equip a new facility is estimated to be **\$17,379,000**. Despite the strides we have made, if we do not get the balance of the funding in FY 2013, the QCC cannot be completed and will not open with the New Regional Hospital. Furthermore, additional funding delays will increase total project cost.

It was originally estimated that the baseline cost to construct a new Quyanna Care Center Facility would increase by \$3M if construction was delayed until after the New Regional Hospital completion (new contractor mobilization costs and no economy of scale related to management, equipment, and other general support cost), plus \$500K for every year of delay due to inflation. Although construction has already begun, remobilizing contractors, protection of the structure in place, and redesigns for applicable code updates, could result in a cost increase in excess of the \$3M. The impacts of not following through with the states funding commitment go beyond cost premiums and patient care. Other liabilities include; vandalism, local children getting hurt on the unused structure, and leaving a building standing, which was never intended to remain incomplete in arctic conditions. As you can see, it is imperative we receive the remaining funding to complete QCC as scheduled.

Considering the \$910,000 NSHC has contributed, Denali Commission has authorized \$1,024,000 and the \$7M appropriated by the State for Phase I in FY 2012, the current funding shortfall is \$8,445M. This amount is needed in the FY 2013 State Budget. NSHC is requesting \$8,445M to complete the Quyanna Care Center in FY 2013.

The State Legislature agreed to fund the QCC Project, but decided on a phased distribution, with \$7,000,000 appropriated in FY 2012 and the remainder in FY 2013. Funding for this project is being provided in two separate fiscal years which required that the construction scope and contract be split into two separate phases, which is inherently more complex and less efficient.

Dear Roy:

On behalf of Kawerak Incorporated, I am writing to express our full support for Norton Sound Health Corporation's efforts to procure funding to construct a Long Term Care Facility and Assisted Living Facility in close proximity to the new hospital.

NSHC's current long term care facility - "Quyanna Care" - is housed at the existing hospital site. When NSHC moves its operations to the new hospital, it will be extremely difficult to continue to operate Quyanna Care at the old hospital. The facility is old, expensive to maintain and heat, there would be many logistical problems. For example, NSHC would have to operate two dietary departments - one at the old hospital to feed the elders and one at the new hospital for patients, visitors and staff. It would be logistically challenging to provide medical care to the Elders, since they would have to be transported to the new facility for physical therapy, x-rays, etc. and other needed services. Doctors and other medical staff would also have to travel to the old facility to provide routine and emergency services to the Elders.

It is less expensive to the State of Alaska to support long term care services within a tribal or IHS facility, since the federal government reimburses the cost of care at 100% for services within an IHS or Tribal Facility and only 60% within other facilities. This facility is greatly needed in the region, since without a facility in the region; Elders would have to be transported to Anchorage, Fairbanks or other areas, to receive the services they need at a higher cost to the State of Alaska. By keeping our Elders within the region, family members are also able to keep in close contact with their loved one.

We are also supportive of NSHC's efforts to construct an Assisted Living Facility. We have many elders in the region who require assistance on a daily basis but do not require skilled nursing care. There is no facility in the region that provides the intermediate level of assistance between assistance at home and admittance into Long Term Care.

We encourage our legislature, funders and agencies to assist NSHC with meeting these needs.

**A RESOLUTION OF SUPPORT BY THE NOME COMMON COUNCIL
FOR THE NORTON SOUND HEALTH CORPORATION LONG TERM CARE FACILITY
FUNDING REQUEST**

WHEREAS, long term care in the Nome region is essential to maximize quality of life for local elders; and

WHEREAS, Norton Sound Health Corporation (NSHC) currently operates Quyanna Care Center, a long term care facility, at the existing NSHC hospital in the City of Nome; and,

WHEREAS, construction on the new NSHC hospital continues, with estimated completion in late 2012, at a location two miles from the current hospital; and,

WHEREAS, it is not feasible to maintain a long term care facility at a separate site from the new hospital due to higher operational and staffing costs; and,


WHEREAS, expenses for a new long term care facility could be minimized if scheduled coincident to the new hospital construction and opening; and,

WHEREAS, for the new long term care facility project NSHC has committed \$910,000 of its Board Designated Assets, the Denali Commission has contributed \$1,024,000, and the State of Alaska Legislatures appropriated \$7,000,000 in FY 2012; and,

WHEREAS, after current funding, the amount necessary to complete the project without increase due to delayed construction is \$7,901,000;

WHEREAS, the City of Nome, Norton Sound Health Corporation (NSHC), and several other Nome entities support the need for an Assisted Living Facility in the immediate region; and

WHEREAS, no facility in the area is able to provide assistance with daily living activities for elders or physically disabled adults; and,

WHEREAS, studies show a high number of elders and physically disabled adults have been required to leave the Nome region to access necessary assistance with daily living activities; and,

WHEREAS, a higher quality of life could be achieved for these individuals if such means were available locally; and,

WHEREAS, NSHC has proposed to build a ten unit Assisted Living Facility in Nome near the location of the new NSHC regional hospital; and,


WHEREAS, NSHC has procured the land and completed the building pad, and estimates a cost of \$8,225,000 to design, construct, and equip the facility; and,
