Funding Details:

2011 APF removed unused tennis courts and made substantial structural repairs to the boardwalk, investing \$54,000 in the park improvements. Neighbors compiled a list of priority fix-its, and the Anchorage Park Foundation considers new and safe play equipment and surfacing Phase II of this neighborhood project.

Detailed Project Description and Justification:

Campbell Park is a well-loved park along the Campbell Creek, but neighbors report unsafe activities there at night, as well as the evidence of drug and alcohol use. Neighbors have formed a Take Back Our Park Committee whose first priority is safe play equipment for the park.

In 2011 APF responded to community concerns about unsafe use of the boardwalk and tennis courts. This first phase of renovation is complete.

This legislative request is for Phase II park improvements, and would be for playground replacement and new play surface materials.

The Take Back Our Park resolution of support is attached to this request.

WHEREAS, established in 2008, TBOP (Take Back Our Park) is a committee in Anchorage's Central Parks District which meets on pre-planned third Mondays of several months; and

WHEREAS, Committee members include residents in the Campbell Park area adjacent to Tudor Road, representatives from the Police Department, Parks and Recreation, Community Councils, Anchorage Rescue Mission, ARBRA, and others; and

WHEREAS, the mission of TBOP encourages Campbell Creek Park area residents and businesses to join the "Take Back Our Park" (TBOP) community group creating workable plans, joining efforts, and taking action to provide safe, clean and enjoyable park conditions; and

WHEREAS, TBOP participants have identified and discussed the need for replacing the existing play equipment (suitable for 2-5 year olds including ADA requirements) in Campbell Park because currently it is beyond a "useful life";and

WHEREAS, Committee members have, in the past, requested assistance from other sources to help fund new play equipment but this effort has been unsuccessful;

NOW, THEREFORE, TBOP participants fully support and request that the Alaska State Legislature approve the \$200,000 Capital Budget request to replace the playground equipment for Campbell Creek Park to be managed by the Anchorage Park Foundation.

Campbell Park, Equipment Safety Upgrades

Park Report Card Grade: D-

The Anchorage Park Foundation and the Municipality of Anchorage Parks & Recreation Department are working together to address need for "fix-its" in small under-served neighborhood parks.

The **Anchorage Parks Report Card** creates a comprehensive picture of the condition of our neighborhood parks, reflecting the Anchorage community's opinions, preferences and ideas. In Fall 2011, Anchorage community volunteers evaluated 51 neighborhood parks based on 6 different settings. Parks were surveyed based on cleanliness, safety, structure, appearance, and function. Anchorage Parks and Recreation staff will use this information to strategically employ its funding and volunteer resources to better meet the needs of the Anchorage community.

In the summers of 2009-2011, the Anchorage Park Foundation and the Parks & Recreation Department mobilized thousands of parks volunteers to revitalize neighborhood parks by completing community-identified fix-its. This winter, the Anchorage Park Foundation and the Parks & Recreation Department are partnering with Community Councils, park user groups and park neighbors to plan the 2012 and 2013 neighborhood park fix-its.

In 2011, Campbell Park recieved a D- on its Report Card. Concerned neighbors including the Campbell Take Back Our Parks (TBOP) Committee reported **unsafe** activities occurring in Campbell Park, as well as evidence of drugs and alcohol left each night. Community members noted that clearing low limbs and brush from green areas would improve visibility, creating a safer park environment. Other concerns they want to see addressed include unsafe and jagged play surfaces, vandalism, and inadequate play equipment for community use.

In the Summer of 2013, the Anchorage Park Foundation and Parks & Recreation Department will work with parks volunteers to complete neighborhood park fix-its in Campbell Park. We invite the Alaska State Legislature to join us in investing in the future of Campbell Park and the Central community. **The Anchorage Park Foundation will match legislative investment in neighborhood park fix-its with volunteer involvement and generous support from the Rasmuson Foundation's Anchorage Parks Initiative.**
