In 2011 APF paved a parking lot, installed new benches, trashcans, and signs, investing \$64,000 in this beloved park's renovation. This funding request is for a Phase II to replace the aging play equipment.

Detailed Project Description and Justification:

Fairview Lions Park is a large greenspace near high density housing and busy streets in Fairview. Walking distance to the Fairview Recreation Center, this park has a large playfield and a well-loved community garden. The play equipment here has outlived its useful life, and is now more a park hazard than a community asset.

In 2007 community volunteers revitalized Fairview Lions Park and installed a plaza and the community garden during the Fairview Day of Caring.

In 2011 APF made repairs to the park that had been identified in the 2006 Parks Report Card process by neighbors. The muddy area that pedestrians had to walk through to enter the park was paved, and the entryway clearly marked. The benches and trashcans were replaced.

APF requests funding for a Phase II of this park improvement to completely replace the aging play equipment (and play surface) for all ages. Neighborhood support is attached to this request.

The Anchorage Park Foundation (APF) and the Municipality of Anchorage Parks & Recreation Department (APRD) are working together to address need for "fix-its" in small under-served neighborhood parks.

The **Anchorage Parks Report Card** creates a comprehensive picture of the condition of our neighborhood parks, reflecting the Anchorage community's opinions, preferences and ideas. In Fall 2011, Anchorage community volunteers evaluated 51 neighborhood parks based on 6 different settings. Parks were surveyed based on cleanliness, safety, structure, appearance, and function. APRD staff will use this information to strategically employ its funding and volunteer resources to better meet the needs of the Anchorage community.

In Summers 2009-2011, APF and APRD mobilized thousands of parks volunteers to revitalize neighborhood parks by completing community-identified fix-its. This winter, APF and APRD are partnering with Community Councils, park user groups and park neighbors to plan the 2012 and 2013 neighborhood park fix-its.

Fairview Lions Park is a large greenspace near high density housing and busy streets in Fairview. Walking distance to the Fairview Recreation Center, this park has a large playfield and a well-loved community garden. However, the play equipment is now more of a community hazard than a community asset. In 2011, Fairview Lions Park recieved a D- on its Report Card. Community members reported feeling like Fairview Lions Park has great potential to attract both locals and visitors alike, but that it needs new and safer playground equipment that attracts people from all over the city and brings them to Fairview. The Fairview Community Council is very passionate about continuing to work to revitalize Fairview Lions Park.

In the summer of 2013, the Anchorage Park Foundation and Parks & Recreation Department will work with parks volunteers to complete neighborhood park fix-its in Fairview Lions Park. We invite the Alaska State Legislature to join us in investing in the future of Fairview Lions Park and the Northwest community. The Anchorage Park Foundation will match legislative investment in neighborhood park fix-its with volunteer involvement and generous support from the Rasmuson Foundation's Anchorage Parks Initiative.

ADDITIONAL FUNDING REQUEST FOR PLAYGROUND PROJECT

The North Russian Jack Springs Park project was not identified for a legislative proposal until after the Assembly voted on their 2012 State Legislative Program. This project has had ample community involvement, and Phase I of construction is planned for 2012. The APF requests \$300,000 to complete the project as an iconic Anchorage play area.
