Detailed Project Description and Justification:

The Tony Knowles Coastal trail was constructed during the 1980's and is one of Anchorage's most important community assets.

The trail starts in downtown Anchorage at the end of 2nd avenue, and continues for 11 miles along the Knik Arm coastline through some of Anchorage's most scenic parks, ending at Kincaid Park. The trail provides a unique opportunity to enjoy hiking, biking, skiing, in-line skating and other recreational activities within one of the most scenic areas of the Anchorage bow.

During the past 25 years, the Tony Knowles Coastal Trail has weathered the harsh seasonal conditions associated with the coastal location, and many areas have deteriorated enough to warrant significant repair. In summer of 2011 the parks department resurfaced one mile of trail near Pt. Woronzoff successfully. This is the start of a multi-year plan to repair sections of trail and protect the crown jewel of the Anchorage trail system.

Parks and Recreation utilized Trail Watch volunteers to create a comprehensive picture of the condition of the trail in 2011. The trail was surveyed based on five trail features including trail heads, amenities, surface, shoulder, vegetation and bridges and tunnels. Department staff will use this information to rank the areas of trail for rehabilitation.





Turnagain Community Council Ranking Recommendations for the Municipality of Anchorage's 2012 Capital Projects Needs List — ANCHORAGE PARKS & RECREATION Approved at TCC meeting June 2, 2011

1. Lyn Ary Park Property Acquisition (ADDITION TO LIST) — Funding for acquisition of privately owned property at the northern end of Lyn Ary Park at the north end of ball field and where a portion of the Coastal Trail is located (parcel #99999999999). Parcel is currently owned by the Marston Foundation. This acquisition is identified in the Lyn Ary Park Master Plan, which was approved in 2010.

2. **Coastal Trail Buffer/Greenbelt Acquisition (ADDITION TO LIST)** — Funding for acquisition of undeveloped land and conservation easements on non-municipal properties west of Lyn Ary Park to Earthquake Park for protected Coastal Trail greenbelt designation. Because the city has constructed road access to this land, it is a high priority that the city identify and acquire any available land before it is cleared and developed for housing.

3. Tony Knowles Coastal Trail Rehabilitation (ADDITION TO LIST) — Rehabilitate, through bio-engineering improvements, to address erosion/drainage and deterioration along the trail.

4. Lyn Ary Park (ADDITION TO LIST) — Leverage 2006 and 2008 State Legislative Grants. Projects that are contained in the Lyn Ary Park Master Plan include: safety upgrades to trails, parking, site furniture (benches, litter bins, picnic tables), playground equipment and installation of dog refuse stations. Additional improvements called for in the Plan include: interpretation signage and park gateways, pathway upgrades, additional playground equipment, and bleacher and bench improvements.

5. **Earthquake Park (ADDITION TO LIST)** — Install low-level parking lot lighting and security cameras. Upgrade landscaping.

6. Tony Knowles Coastal Trail to Fish Creek Trail Connection (ADDITION TO LIST) — TCC supports this project, but emphasizes that any design should be sensitive to property owner impacts as well as impacts to creek and adjacent riparian habitat.

7. **Margaret Sullivan Park (Westchester Lagoon) (ADDITION TO LIST)** — Projects include a children's play area, safety upgrades to the Trail Watch Headquarters, trail safety improvements, parking, lighting and winter access improvements. TCC supports these projects, but desires no/minimal vegetation removal to ensure the aesthetic/habitat quality of the park are preserved.

8. **Pt. Woronzof Park (ADDITION TO LIST)** — Park signage along the Coastal Trail and Pt. Woronzof Road identifying park boundaries, so the public knows it is parkland, not airport land. If this can be done through other means than the CIP process, please inform TCC how this can be accomplished.

9. Lloyd Steel/Balto Seppala Parks (ADDITION TO LIST) — Design and construction of a multi-use trail that would surround and connect both parks using the board walk that was constructed in 2010, as per the TCC-approved conceptual Master Plan for the parks

ADDITIONAL FUNDING REQUEST FOR PLAYGROUND PROJECT
