Funds have been secured and used to design the transit facility with ARRA money. BIA IRR funds were used for Geo-tech work. BBEDC Block Grant funds have been secured for the purchase of a hydraulic boat trailer and a CAT 980 Wheel Loader. Freight will be covered through BIA IRR monies.

Detailed Project Description and Justification:

The community of Togiak has focused its efforts on collaboration and unity among the governing agencies and has been able to develop more projects as a result. The waterfront transit facility will be the first of its kind located in Togiak proper and will be a great asset to enhance recently developed infrastructure and further economic development. The community has developed a fifty percent locally owned processing facility called Togiak Seafoods and the operations are reliant on the ability to have fish buying stations at the point. The dock will present a place for fishermen to tie up their boat, offload fish and reload needed supplies. Ice and tender operations will have a place to offload fish and reload supplies. Togiak Seafoods has demonstrated great successes in raising ex-vessel prices for fishermen in Togiak as well as all of Bristol Bay, also providing training, employment and economic sustainability. Togiak Seafoods is working towards partnering with other entities and communities to expand operations and purchase tenders, but this is dependent on a new waterfront facility for efficient operations. The dock will provide a place for sea freight companies to offload freight in a manner that will not damage the high priced items. This will be beneficial for all in Togiak. The dock will present a place to load outgoing freight barges with gravel bound for other communities. The dock will also present a place for a new fuel header for the drastically needed fuel tank farm upgrade. The facility has been designed for all existing needs as well as future needs and uses. The facility will be available for public use and Togiak Seafoods needs free of charge due to the joint efforts in the development, funding and construction. The dock will provide the community of Togiak with another tool to have success in its efforts towards self sustainability and reduce reliance on diminishing government funding. The community of Togiak possesses the ability to force account the project and reduce mobilization and demobilization costs. A MOA will be developed between the Traditional Council of Togiak, Togiak Natives Limited and the City of Togiak identifying each entities rights, roles and responsibilities of the new facility. The project is nearly shovel ready with 95 percent design. The last five percent is permitting and is nearly done. The detailed project drawings and estimates are available upon request.

Interested parties are hereby notified that a Department of the Army permit application has been received for work in waters of the United States as described below and shown on the enclosed project drawings.

<u>APPLICANT</u>: Traditional Council of Togiak, P.O. Box 310, Togiak, Alaska 99678. Point of contact: Mr. Jonathan Forsling, telephone (907) 493-5003.

LOCATION: The project site is located within Section 12, T. 13 S., R. 67 W., Seward Meridian; USGS Quad Map Goodnews A-4; Latitude 59.0644° N., Longitude 160.3662° W.; at Togiak, Alaska.

<u>PURPOSE</u>: The applicant's stated purpose is to provide access for barges and create a crane platform for loading activities.

PROPOSED WORK: Place 5,500 cubic yards (cy) of fill material into 0.6 acre of tidelands to construct a sheet pile bulkhead dock and an adjacent ramp. The face of the dock would be 160' wide and would extend to +1.7' above MLLW. The width of the ramp would be 35' plus a riprap shoulder. The project would require 10,500 cy of gravel fill, armor rock, filter rock, and concrete. Of this 5,500 cy would be below the high tide line (HTL) and 3,900 cy would be below mean high water (MHW). The fill would be placed on 0.93 acre, of which 0.60 acre would be below the HTL and 0.50 acre would be below MHW.

All work would be performed in accordance with the enclosed plan (sheets 1-4), dated January 26, 2012.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION: According to the applicant, the proposed Togiak Multipurpose Dock and Ramp Facility project will meet multiple needs of the Togiak community. There are no significant waterfront facilities located in Togiak, Alaska. As such, loading/unloading of fish, bulk freight, and fuel occurs directly on the beach. The proposed facility will serve the local regional economy including commercial fishing and seafood processing facilities, petroleum product suppliers, local regional exports and movement of general cargo. The proposed dock is a tidal facility (site is dry at low tide). The facility is located on the south end of town, offshore of the spit created by Nasaurluq Creek. On the eastern side of the dock, the ramp is proposed to facilitate use by landing craft to load and offload cargo and supplies and also for local residents and subsistence users to launch and retrieve boats.

APPLICANT PROPOSED MITIGATION: The applicant proposes the following mitigation measures to avoid, minimize, and compensate for impacts to waters of the United States from activities involving discharges of dredged or fill material.

- a. Avoidance: It is not possible to completely avoid impacts to waters of the U.S. and still meet the project purpose.
- b. Minimization: The proposed sheet pile bulkhead fill dock design limits the amount of fill materials placed in tidelands to the greatest extent possible by placing the dock parallel to the natural shoreline. Vessel operators will be required to work the tides to use the dock, which will allow for deeper draft watercrafts without having to increase the size of the structure. The dock size is the minimum necessary to accommodate the design vessels working on the tides, crane swing radius, usable space, and provide the necessary upland storage area needed for efficient operations. Clean fill materials will be obtained from an upland source limiting chance of the introduction of contaminated materials.
- c. Compensatory Mitigation: In-lieu Fee mitigation is planned to be utilized for impacts that are unavoidable.

WATER QUALITY CERTIFICATION: A permit for the described work will not be issued until a certification or waiver of certification, as required under Section 401 of the Clean Water Act (Public Law 95-217), has been received from the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation.

CULTURAL RESOURCES: The latest published version of the Alaska Heritage Resources Survey (AHRS) has been consulted for the presence or absence of historic properties, including those listed in or eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places. There are no listed or eligible properties in the vicinity of the worksite. Consultation of the AHRS constitutes the extent of cultural resource investigations by the District Commander at this time, and he is otherwise unaware of the presence of such resources. This application is being coordinated with the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO). Any comments SHPO may have concerning presently unknown archeological or historic data that may be lost or destroyed by work under the requested permit will be considered in our final assessment of the described work.

ENDANGERED SPECIES: The project area is within the known or historic range of the Steller's eider (Polysticta stelleri). Preliminarily, we have determined the described activity would have no effect on the Steller's eider and would have no

effect on any designated or proposed critical habitat, under the Endangered Species Act of 1973 (87 Stat. 844). This application is being coordinated with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS). Any comments they may have concerning endangered or threatened wildlife or plants or their critical habitat will be considered in our final assessment of the described work.

ESSENTIAL FISH HABITAT: The Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act, as amended by the Sustainable Fisheries Act of 1996, requires all Federal agencies to consult with the NMFS on all actions, or proposed actions, permitted, funded, or undertaken by the agency, that may adversely affect Essential Fish Habitat (EFH).

The project area is within the known range of yellowfin sole, Chinook salmon, sockeye salmon, chum salmon, coho salmon, and pink salmon. Preliminarily, we have determined the described activity would adversely affect EFH in the project area for these species. The project, as proposed, would include fill placement and pile driving in water while fish may be present. This Public Notice initiates EFH consultation with the NMFS. Any comments or recommendations they may have concerning EFH will be considered in our final assessment of the described work.

TRIBAL CONSULTATION: The Alaska District fully supports tribal self-governance and government-to-government relations between Federally recognized Tribes and the Federal government. Tribes with protected rights or resources that could be significantly affected by a proposed Federal action (e.g., a permit decision) have the right to consult with the Alaska District on a government-to-government basis. Views of each Tribe regarding protected rights and resources will be accorded due consideration in this process. This Public Notice serves as notification to the Tribes within the area potentially affected by the proposed work and invites their participation in the Federal decision-making process regarding the protected Tribal right or resource. Consultation may be initiated by the affected Tribe upon written request to the District Commander during the public comment period.

<u>PUBLIC HEARING</u>: Any person may request, in writing, within the comment period specified in this notice, that a public hearing be held to consider this application. Requests for public hearings shall state, with particularity, reasons for holding a public hearing.

EVALUATION: The decision whether to issue a permit will be based on an evaluation of the probable impacts, including cumulative impacts of the proposed activity and its intended use on the public interest. Evaluation of the probable impacts, which the proposed activity may have on the public interest, requires a careful weighing of all the factors that become relevant in each particular case. The benefits, which reasonably may be expected to accrue from the proposal, must be balanced against its reasonably foreseeable detriments. The outcome of the general balancing process would determine whether to authorize a proposal, and if so, the conditions under which it will be allowed to occur. The decision should reflect the national concern for both protection and utilization of important resources. All factors, which may be relevant to the proposal, must be considered including the cumulative effects thereof. Among those are conservation, economics, aesthetics, general environmental concerns, wetlands, cultural values, fish and wildlife values, flood hazards, floodplain values, land use, navigation, shore erosion and accretion, recreation, water supply and conservation, water quality, energy needs, safety, food and fiber production, mineral needs, considerations of property ownership, and, in general, the needs and welfare of the people. For activities involving 404 discharges, a permit will be denied if the discharge that

would be authorized by such permit would not comply with the Environmental Protection Agency's 404(b)(l) guidelines. Subject to the preceding sentence and any other applicable guidelines or criteria (see Sections 320.2 and 320.3), a permit will be granted unless the District Commander determines that it would be contrary to the public interest.

The Corps of Engineers is soliciting comments from the public; Federal, State, and local agencies and officials; Indian Tribes; and other interested parties in order to consider and evaluate the impacts of this proposed activity. Any comments received will be considered by the Corps of Engineers to determine whether to issue, modify, condition or deny a permit for this proposal. To make this decision, comments are used to assess impacts on endangered species, historic properties, water quality, general environmental effects, and the other public interest factors listed above. Comments are used in the preparation of an Environmental Assessment and/or an Environmental Impact Statement pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act. Comments are also used to determine the need for a public hearing and to determine the overall public interest of the proposed activity.

AUTHORITY: This permit will be issued or denied under the following authorities:

- (X) Perform work in or affecting navigable waters of the United States Section 10 Rivers and Harbors Act 1899 (33 U.S.C. 403).
- (X) Discharge dredged or fill material into waters of the United States Section 404 Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C. 1344). Therefore, our public interest review will consider the guidelines set forth under Section 404(b) of the Clean Water Act (40 CFR 230).

Company teaches village to care for catch all the way to market.

Give a man a fish and you feed him for a day.

Teach him how to properly bleed, chill, process and market that fish and you can sustain an entire village for a much longer time.

That's the lesson learned by residents of Togiak, a Yup'ik Eskimo community, in the midst of Togiak National Wildlife Refuge, in Southwest Alaska. Commercial fisheries, after all, are the mainstay of the economy for some 900 Togiak residents.

WHEREAS, The Traditional Council of Togiak (TCT) is the governing body for the Federally recognized Tribe of Togiak whose members are predominantly Yupik Eskimo, and

WHEREAS, Togiak Natives Limited, Inc.(TNL), is a corporation created under the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (ANCSA), which holds title to the surface rights of substantial property in Togiak, and

WHEREAS, The City Council (City) is the governing body for the City of Togiak, a second class city, which provides city services in Togiak, and

WHEREAS, The TCT, TNL and City have a joint working agreement for the development of Togiak, and

WHEREAS, The TCT, TNL and City recognize that government funding is continually being reduced and cut, and

WHEREAS, The TCT, TNL and City are proactively developing projects that will sustain the community into the future and reduce reliance on diminishing government funding, and

WHEREAS, The TCT, TNL and City lack a local waterfront facility sufficient for the economic development and support needs of Togiak and its governing entities, and

WHEREAS, The TCT, TNL and City recognize that viable docks and harbors are likely more essential to the fabric of life in our Alaska communities than anywhere else in the country, and
