The Ruth Arcand Equestrian Trail Rehabilitation is one proposed work project of the award-winning Youth Employment in Parks (YEP) program.

The Anchorage Horse Council (AHC) plans to rehabilitate approximately 2100 feet of trail in Ruth Arcand Park to improve trail surface and meet clearance standards for equestrian use.

The rehabilitation will address drainage problems that continue to destabilize trails in a number of locations, so the improved trails will also be more durable.


