Under AS 22.20.037(c), the court system is required to conduct an annual salary survey to ensure that court employees receive salaries that are consistent with salaries paid to the classified and partially exempt state employees in the executive branch. In the early 1990's, the court system did not receive the 3.3% raise that employees in the executive branch received for the cost of living increase and the following year the court employees voted in a union. The union has now been decertified, but the court has been vigilant about reviewing the court's salaries for parity with the executive branch.												
The most common compensation concern raised by court employees is the discontinuation of annual merit increases upon reaching "F" step. For FY01, the largest union in the executive branch - the General Government Unit - negotiated a revised salary schedule that added a "G" step between the "F" step and the first longevity step. This new step is calculated at "F" step + 3.75%. Inserting a "G" step allows long-term, knowledgeable employees an opportunity to progress through another salary step prior to reaching the first longevity step. Inserting a "G" step will also place the court system on an even keel with the executive branch, which was the intent of AS 22.20.037(c).

Since the retirement of Justice Jay Rabinowitz more than 10 years ago, there has not been a sitting supreme court justice in Fairbanks. In January 2008 Justice Daniel Winfree began serving in Fairbanks as a supreme court justice taking the place of retired Justice Alexander Bryner. The employees that supported retired Justice Bryner were Anchorage-based positions. Unlike Fairbanks, Anchorage does not have a geographic differential added to the base salary amounts paid employees. The court system is seeking additional funding to cover the increased personal services expenses for appellate court staff that will now be serving in Fairbanks. This annual cost will be \$33,400.												
The justices from Juneau and Fairbanks require administrative assistance while they are working in Anchorage. In the past, supporting the Juneau justice was accomplished through a coordinated effort and distribution of the additional work among the clerical staff supporting the Anchorage-based justices. With the appointment of a Fairbanks-based justice, the need for extra administrative support required has now doubled, although the number of Anchorage-based judicial assistants has been reduced by one. When a justice is not in his or her home chambers, that justice cannot produce work without the assistance of local staff. This includes circulating new draft opinions, circulating voting memos, and proofreading opinions for publication. Additionally, with the

appointment of the Fairbanks justice, the Fairbanks court will now become an appellate court filing site. Acceptance of filings at a court location outside of Anchorage will require the documents be sent to Anchorage for review and processing. This will not change with the new case management system. Having additional local assistance available in Anchorage will be essential to a smooth workflow. This position is estimated to cost \$73,000.												
Finally, the court system is seeking additional funding for the travel expenses for Justice Winfree to regularly travel to Anchorage for supreme court oral arguments, court conferences and other court business. The cost for the additional travel is estimated to be \$13,500.

The appellate courts have 55 permanent, full-time employees. The appellate courts receive an annual operating appropriation of only \$9,200 for equipment and furniture - an average of \$167/position. Due to the limited funding, the appellate courts are unable to purchase needed replacement computer equipment and ergonomically correct workstations and replacement furniture. Experts recommend a three-year replacement cycle for PCs and a four-year replacement cycle for printers. The court plans to keep its equipment in place for an additional year beyond the recommended guidelines, but requires a sustained funding source to facilitate this cycled approach. This request is for \$92,800 to replace aging computer systems and an additional \$25,000 for workstations and furniture.

An agency the size of the court system falls within the OMB staffing guidelines for managing its personal services budget within a 4% - 7% vacancy factor. The court system has been managing with a 6% - 7% vacancy factor, which is achieved by holding vacated positions open for a 30-day period. Because of backlogged caseloads and to prevent increased numbers of backlogged caseloads, the court system has asked its retiring judges to give as much advanced notice as possible to permit an adequate amount of time for the selection and appointment processes to occur prior to the judicial officer leaving his or her position. To achieve the goal of 0% vacancy of judicial positions, the court system will require additional funds within the personal services budgets of the appellate and trial courts.

With this position comes the responsibility to participate in interagency meetings, court functions, and official events, many of which occur in Anchorage.

Based on its size, the court system falls within OMB staffing guidelines for managing its personal services budget within a 4% - 7% vacancy factor. The court system has been managing with a 6% - 7% vacancy factor by holding vacated positions open for a 30-day period. To prevent further case backlogs, the court system has asked retiring judges to give sufficient notice to permit selection and appointment of their replacements before leaving their positions. To attain 0% vacancy of judicial positions, the court system needs to increase personal services budgets of the appellate and trial courts. Towards this effort, the appellate courts received \$50,000 in FY10.

The appellate courts have 56 permanent, full-time employees. Prior to FY10, the appellate courts received an annual operating appropriation of \$9,200 for equipment and furniture, an average of \$167 per position. In FY10, the court system requested an additional \$117,800 per year for replacement computers, printers, workstations and office furniture. The legislature approved an additional \$50,000 per year. This request is for the balance of the funding needed to insure the appellate courts have an on-going source of funding to replace outdated equipment and worn-out furnishings.

For FY11, the court system received funding to increase the geographic differentials for court employees up to the amounts then being paid to union employees working in the Supervisory Unit (SU) and General Government Unit (GGU). However, beginning in FY12, those union employees will have new geographic differentials applied to their salaries. Those changes were approved by the legislature last session when it ratified the collective bargaining agreements.												
This increment reflects the court system's cost of adopting the FY12 union geographic differentials in a phased manner. Court employees favorably impacted by a changed geographic differential will receive the new salary amount. Court employees working in locations negatively impacted by the changed geographic differentials will remain on the existing pay schedules. As these employees are replaced, newly hired staff will be placed on the new schedules with the reduced geographic differential.

Automation of its case management system requires the court system to regularly update its operating systems to be compatible with updated software versions and licensing requirements. Rapid advancements in computer technology requires the court system to continually evaluate and improve its base of technological equipment. In the past, the court system has received sporadic grant and capital funding to replace equipment and operating systems. To ensure a planned, life-cycle approach to replacement of these systems, a sustained source of funding must be incorporated into the court system's base operating budget. Experts recommend replacement cycles of three years for personal computers (PCs) and servers, and four years for printers. The court system currently keeps equipment in place for an additional year beyond the recommended guidelines, but requires a sustained funding source to facilitate this cycled approach. In its funding base, the court system has received \$500,000. Last year the court system requested an additional \$175,000 for equipment replacement and received an appropriation of \$75,000. The additional \$100,000 will secure a base funding of \$600,000 to facilitate a planned life-cycle approach for replacement of these critical systems. Funding for this increment will be requested as follows: \$25,000 in Appellate; \$25,000 in Administration; and \$50,000 in the Trial Courts.

The court system is requesting a budget amendment to upgrade an existing Bethel Magistrate position to that of District Court Judge. The court case volume, case composition, and trial demands in Bethel are significant and are increasing as the population continues to increase in the Bethel census area. Of the Bethel district court cases filed in FY04, 64% were misdemeanors. District court judges hear misdemeanor cases as a routine course of business; whereas, magistrates can only handle misdemeanor cases if the defendant consents. Currently, if a defendant refuses to consent, the matter must be transferred to a Bethel superior court judge or to a district court judge from Fairbanks. Additionally, although not recommended for a sustained caseload, a district court judge is permitted to serve as a superior court judge pro tempore. Occasional use of the district court judge to cover superior court matters helps to ensure the court is meeting its speedy trial requirements in criminal cases, thereby reducing the risk of losing cases that are not tried in a timely fashion due to inadequate court resources.

The court system has since learned that anticipated FY06 non-federal grant receipts will likely exceed the FY06 amount currently requested. The court system is therefore requesting another \$50,000 be added to its SDPR authority.

Due to increased fuel costs, utility rates are projected to increase by another 16% over FY06 amounts. Efforts to reduce consumption and improve building energy efficiencies have been successful, but do not generate enough savings to offset the soaring costs. The court estimates it will need an additional \$119,000 to address utility charges for the trial courts throughout the state. Additionally, service contractors for snow removal and janitorial services have advised the court that due to increasing fuel costs, they are forced to increase amounts charged the court. The amount needed to cover the increase in FY07 is projected to be \$91,400. Without increased funding, the additional utility and service contracts costs must be absorbed within the maintenance budget. Diverting funds from on-going maintenance activities to cover the cost of increased utilities will cause these critical maintenance activities to be deferred. The court already faces the challenge of funding deferred maintenance that accumulated in prior years.												
The Palmer court expansion project schedule anticipates the court will occupy the new space in January 2007. Based on the court's cost per square foot to operate the current building over the last two years, the court requires an additional \$30,000 to cover six months' of operating expense for the expanded area in FY07. Another \$30,000 will be requested in FY08 to cover the other six months' of operating expense.

The second district requests \$256,700 for three permanent full-time positions. Each position is described below.												
Nome trial courts requests \$95,000 for a permanent full-time rural court training assistant. The second district is currently the only district without a rural court trainer position. Although the second district has fewer clerical staff than the other districts, it has proportionally higher turnover in clerical positions. This proportionally higher turnover requires training to be conducted with greater frequency. This position will provide administrative, technical, and clerical assistance to rural courts in program areas such as case processing, fiscal procedures, personnel management, customer service, and general court management. The position will travel regularly to

rural courts to assess compliance with court system rules, policies and procedures and will serve as rural clerk of court or deputy magistrate during clerical vacancies or extended staff absences.

The Kotzebue and Barrow superior courts are clerically staffed with one clerk of court and four deputy clerks. Due to the minimal number of staff within these courts, adequate staffing is not always available to address both the in-court and "front counter" customer service needs of these courts. These two courts are also plagued with excessive vacancies and high turnover rates. These conditions further negatively impact the staffing issues within the second district courts. Kotzebue and Barrow courts are each seeking an additional permanent full-time deputy court clerk. This clerk position will manage telephone communications, jury coordination and walk-in customers, who are there to make payments, file cases, obtain forms and ask a myriad of questions. Customer service is severely impacted by the limited number of staffing within the clerk's office. Following is court-specific case filing information that has impacted the operations of these second district courts:

Kotzebue trial court's superior court case filings are up 38% and district court case filings are up 29% from FY04 to FY05. This position and related expenses will cost approximately \$76,500.

Barrow trial court's superior court felony case filings are up 53% from FY04 to FY05. Case filings increased by 26% for children's matters and by 32% for domestic relations from FY04 to FY05. This position and related expenses will cost approximately \$85,200.

Third District

The third district requests \$488,500 for eight permanent, full-time positions. Each position is described below.

Dillingham superior court, which is the only superior court that does not have a law clerk, requests a permanent full-time law clerk. Early in this court's history, case loads were small in comparison with other superior court sites and it was decided that a law clerk was not required. This is no longer the case for this court, which in addition to its increased caseload is regularly called upon to cover superior court cases in Unalaska and Naknek. Case filings totals in FY05 are 42% greater than in FY97 when the Dillingham superior court judicial position was created. Population for this area has increased 22.7% from 1990 to 2000. Criminal case filings for this court are up 22%, childrens matters' filings are up 61% and domestic relations case filings are up 22% comparing FY05 case filings against FY04 case filings. This position and related expenses is estimated to cost \$71,900.

Palmer trial courts requests three permanent, full-time court clerks. The caseload for the Palmer court has steadily increased. This increase is in line with burgeoning population increases in the region. Comparing the 1990 census data against the 2000 census data, the Borough's population grew by 49.5%. Population growth for the entire state was only 14% during this same period. From April 2000 to July 2004, the Mat-su Borough's population grew by 21.8% compared with the rest of the state, which increased by only 4.5%. Statistically, case load increases are known to be commensurate with population increases like those seen in the Mat-Su Borough. Case filings are up 62% from FY00 to FY05. Additional resources are required to respond to Palmer's dramatic, steady, case load increases, which are up another 19% comparing FY04 and FY05 case filings totals. These positions will cost approximately \$172,200.

Anchorage trial courts request four permanent full-time court clerk positions. The Municipality of Anchorage is planning to add additional policing resources during calendar year 2006. This represents an increase of approximately 5% additional officers over those currently serving the Anchorage area. The court system estimates that the Anchorage court will require four additional clerical positions to process increased case filings as a result of the additional policing resource. The estimated cost of these positions is \$244,400.

Fourth District

The fourth district requests \$28,700 to upgrade a permanent part-time deputy clerk position to a permanent full-time position.

The Chevak court managed 29% more non-traffic case filings in FY05 than in FY02. The Chevak court is staffed with a magistrate and a half-time court clerk. In past years the court system used prepaid phone cards extensively to save on toll costs for long-distance phone calls. These cards were particularly useful for instate calls as local carriers charged from \$.115 to \$.18 per minute. With a prepaid phone card, the court system was paying \$.0283 or less than three cents per minute for calls made with a Sprint prepaid calling card. Effective October 2008, Sprint sold its interest in prepaid calling cards to a carrier that was unable to provide the instate calling services at the rates formerly offered by Sprint and did not have the facilities to insure that calls made to remote locations would be of sufficient quality to conduct court business. The court system pursued other prepaid calling card vendors, but none could provide a reliable service at less cost than amounts charged by the local carriers, two of which have agreed to charge \$.10 per minute for instate calls. The court system is requesting \$42,000 to pay for these increased telephony costs.

The court system regularly conducts hearings telephonically. By court rule, parties inconvenienced by holding a hearing telephonically must pay the cost of the hearing. The court pays the telephone cost if the judge is able to avoid traveling to the hearing (cost savings measure). For other situations, the defendant, public defender, plaintiff or prosecution would be responsible for the cost of the call. Frequently the payer is another state agency. In the past, the in-court clerk would collect calling cards from the payers and place the calls. This was time-consuming and caused delays in court proceedings. To address the efficiency issue in high-volume proceedings with multiple parties in attendance, the court piloted a project wherein the court system used a teleconferencing service to coordinate the calls. Using the service resolved many issues and placed the burden of calling into the hearing on the parties rather than on the in-court clerk who frequently had to track down parties who may be at home, on their cell phone, at their office, etc. The vendor is extremely reliable is extremely reliable and charges \$.059 per minute for each caller. The court system is requesting \$56,000 in additional funding to expand the pilot project to include all telephonic proceedings and to pay the long-distance charges for telephonic proceedings that would generally be borne by another state agency.

Third District This attorney will assist with handling appeals of decisions issued in agency administrative proceedings, and with post conviction relief petitions (PCR) from prisoners, which are procedurally similar to appeals. Agency appeals and PCR cases, especially those filed by parties not represented by counsel, are particularly time-consuming for the court. Self-represented litigants often file applications and other papers that are procedurally deficient, and they struggle to comply with court rules. Since the agency appeals involve attorneys for those agencies, the problems with poorly-prepared litigants impact those attorneys and agencies as well as the courts. These cases need substantially more monitoring than most civil matters and would benefit from the involvement of a trial court attorney. This position is estimated to cost \$130,800. Although the court system absorbs costs associated with increased rents, utilities, software maintenance, and other operating expenses, this increase cannot be absorbed.

Juror Pay: For the first four months of FY2018, juror pay costs have increased by 60%, or \$107,775 over the costs incurred during the same period in FY2017. At this pace, FY2018 juror pay costs are projected to increase by a total of \$369,500 over FY2017. Because the court system anticipates that this level of costs will continue into FY2019, additional funding of \$360,000 is requested.

Juror Travel: For jury trials held in Bethel and Dillingham, jurors are drawn from a 50 mile radius of these communities. Jurors selected from outlying communities are generally required to fly to the hub court, and the court is required to provide meals and lodging for the duration of their service. Juror travel costs for trials held in Dillingham and Bethel accounted for 87% of the court system's total juror travel costs in FY2017. This is not unusual; over the last five years, juror travel for these locations accounted for an average of 81% of all juror travel costs.

Trial rates for Dillingham and Bethel were reduced significantly in FY2016 and the first half of FY2017, and the savings associated with fewer trials has helped the court system manage its budget reductions. However, trial rates in these courts began to increase during the second half of FY2017 and these rates (and associated costs) continue to rise. With the plan for additional prosecutors within the Department of Law, the number of trials is expected to be even greater. Given the anticipated increase in juror travel for Dillingham and Bethel, the FY2018 statewide juror travel costs are projected to be \$622,000, or \$165,600 more than the costs incurred in FY2017. The court system is seeking \$150,000 for FY2019 toward the cost of juror travel.

FY2018 Costs: Finally, the court system is closely monitoring the FY2018 statewide trial activity. At the current

The Anchorage Veterans' Court is a specialized court designed to facilitate the rehabilitation of eligible veterans who are charged with criminal offenses. The court was started in 2004 in response to the number of veterans appearing in district court who were suffering from medical, behavioral health, or other issues associated with military service-related trauma. The Veterans' Court collaborates with prosecutors, defense attorneys, and the Department of Veterans' Affairs (VA) to link eligible veterans with VA housing, employment, rehabilitation, and treatment services. Once linked to the required services, the court provides monitoring and assistance with tracking conditions of alternative sentencing plea agreements to help eligible veterans succeed with their own rehabilitation and return to a productive and law-abiding lifestyle, thereby reducing crime and its costs to society.												
The Anchorage Veterans' Court has not previously had a designated project coordinator or probation officer; instead, it has been relying on coverage from other therapeutic courts staff. The Alaska Court System and other stakeholders are invested in assuring that the Veterans' Court is aligned with national standards recently established for veterans' court operations. In conjunction with this change, this court now accepts high risk/high need felony cases and has modified their structure to include intensive supervision which is provided by an ASAP probation officer specifically trained to work with therapeutic court referrals. Utilization of the Veterans' Court has steadily increased during the past two fiscal years, increasing from an average of 80% of capacity in FY2016 to an average of 114% of capacity in FY2017. In the past several months, the Anchorage Veterans' Court has continued operating over capacity and this trend is expected to continue. Increased utilization, adoption of the national standards for operating a veterans' court, and inclusion of high risk/high need veterans into this court requires a full-time, dedicated project coordinator position (Range 16).

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There are 51 magistrates and masters in Alaska. Magistrates and masters are not appointed by the Governor, nor are their qualifications reviewed by the Alaska Judicial Council. Their appointments are made for an indefinite period by the presiding judge of the judicial district in which they serve. They serve at the pleasure of the presiding judge, and are not subject to retention elections like Alaskan judges and justices.

In 1997 and 2001, the Court asked the Judicial Council to gather information for a performance evaluation of these judicial officers, many of whom are the sole judicial officers in the locations they serve. The Council surveyed Alaskan attorneys and peace and probation officers and shared the results with the Court. The Court would like the Council to conduct judicial performance surveys about magistrates and masters in FY2007. The Council seeks funding for this project. Requested funds will be used to survey design, editing and transcription (3.0), printing, bulk mail and postage (4.1), hosting of electronic surveys (6.0), and data entry and analysis (18.2).

Alaska Administrative Rule of Court 23 permits the Alaska Court System to assign caseloads to retired judges for a period up to two years. The rule requires the Alaska Judicial Council to evaluate the performance of these judges by surveying members of the bar in the judicial districts where the judges have served. An evaluation must be done so that the Court may determine the eligibility of these judges to continue to serve pro tem. The Council has not been provided with any additional funding to conduct these evaluations. The Council anticipates that it will need to evaluate five pro tem judges in FY2007.

The Council requires funding in the amount of 9.2 for survey design, editing and transcription (.7); printing, bulk mail processing and postage (1.7); hosting of electronic survey (2.5); data entry and analysis (4.3).

Alaska has a long history of cooperation among criminal justice agencies, the legislature and the courts. They have formed criminal justice working groups since the 1970s to develop long-range policies and to resolve shorter-term problems. Outside the sessions, they meet as needed in Anchorage or other locations.												
This increment funds the staffing of a Criminal Justice Working Group for FY08. The funding permits the Council to coordinate the group's meetings, prepare materials, respond to questions asked by the group with data and background, and prepare reports about the group's findings and recommendations. <p>methods successfully reach some individuals, the absence of paid advertising has coincided with a dramatic drop off in involvement by members of the general public. Council members thus are deprived of information that could help them in their duties, and members of the public who might have wished to be involved are not heard. The effect that the requested increment would have in each of the Council's areas of responsibility is described below.</p> <p>Soliciting public input on judicial applicants: The Alaska Judicial Council's longstanding procedures for evaluating applicants for judgeships include participation by members of the public. The most important tool for involving the public is an in-person hearing conducted in the town where the vacancy has occurred. At these hearings, members of the public comment on the qualifications of the applicants, and tell the Council members what qualities or characteristics are important to them for their local judge and what specific problems are facing their local justice system. In 2014, the Council attempted to involve the public in its evaluation of judges standing for retention without paid advertising. Consistent with intent language in HB266, Council staff worked closely with the Legislative Information Office to publicize the statewide retention election hearing held on June 5, 2014. However, for the first time in memory, no members of the public testified on any of the fourteen judges standing for retention. The Council thus was deprived of important information that members of the public could have provided about the qualifications of the judges standing for retention, and members of the public who might have wished to comment were not heard. A portion of the requested increment would be used to solicit public input throughout the judicial performance evaluation process, and to publicize the date/time/purpose of the statewide public hearing on judges who will stand for retention in 2016.</p> <p>Advertising of judicial performance evaluation and retention recommendations to the public: To enable voters to make informed decisions about whether judges should be retained in office, the legislature requires the Council to publicize its evaluations of judges and its recommendations to the voters. It is important for voters to understand the exhaustive process the Judicial Council uses to evaluate judges standing for retention. Voters who understand the Council's evaluation process will understand that they can access the detailed evaluation materials for themselves to make an informed vote. Alternatively, voters will understand that they can access the Judicial Council's recommendations if they do not wish to review the voluminous evaluation materials themselves. The increment would be used to publicize the availability of the Judicial Council's evaluation materials for all judges, and the Judicial Council's recommendations to voters on all judges standing for retention. Consistent with a commitment made by the Council's executive director during a prior legislative session, the Judicial Council will not use the increment to respond to opposition to a judge or justice.
