BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

#### AN ACT

Making appropriations for the operating and loan program expenses of state government and to capitalize funds; and providing for an effective date.

\* Section 1. LEGISLATIVE INTENT. (a) It is the intent of the legislature that the various departments, divisions, and agencies of state government operate strictly within the

appropriation levels approved and authorized by the legislature and governor in the Fiscal

7 Year 1994 state operating budget.

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(b) Appropriate department, division, and agency officials are directed to make reductions where necessary in personnel services, travel, contractual, commodities, equipment, and other administrative support services to meet Fiscal Year 1994 funding levels.

and other administrative support services to meet Fiscal Year 1994 funding levels.

Department officials are further directed to leave intact funding for programs, grants, and

12 services that directly impact the people of Alaska.

(c) It is the intent of the legislature not to fund supplemental budget requests except for those circumstances where statutory formula program caseload estimates were wrong or

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other circumstances that were well beyond the ability of the department to anticipate. It is
further the intent of the legislature not to fund supplemental budget requests, even though
unanticipated, that are small relative to the size of the appropriation. Costs associated with
those unanticipated circumstances should be absorbed by the budget request unit by making
further expense adjustments within the budget request unit.

- (d) It is further the intent of the legislature to take whatever steps may be necessary the following session to ensure Fiscal Year 1994 funding levels are not exceeded. Those steps may include denial of personnel services funding for management employees responsible for implementing budget reductions and operating within Fiscal Year 1994 appropriation levels.
- (e) Departments, divisions, and agency officials should consider this letter of intent an express primary goal of the Eighteenth Alaska State Legislature.
- \* Sec. 2. Included within the general fund amounts appropriated in this Act, the following amounts are from the unreserved special accounts in the general fund:

Highway fuel tax account

\$21,500,000

Aviation fuel tax account

10,500,000

- \* Sec. 3. Federal or other program receipts as defined under AS 37.05.146 that exceed the amounts appropriated in this Act are appropriated conditioned upon compliance with the program review provisions of AS 37.07.080(h).
- \* Sec. 4. If federal or other program receipts as defined under AS 37.05.146 exceed the estimates appropriated by this Act, the appropriation from state funds for the affected program may be reduced by the amount of the excess if the reductions are consistent with applicable federal statutes.
- \* Sec. 5. Except as provided in sec. 6 of this Act, if federal or other program receipts as defined under AS 37.05.146 fall short of the estimates appropriated by this Act, the affected appropriation is reduced by the amount of the shortfall in receipts.

33 powers and duties, accord the highest priority to the development of intermediate sanctions
34 in order to successfully deal with prison overcrowding and budgetary constraints. Towards
35 this end, the department shall be allowed maximum flexibility in allocating its budgetary
36 resources during FY94.

On this date I have signed the following bill and am transmitting the engrossed and enrolled copies to the Lieutenant Governor's Office for permanent filing:

# CONFERENCE COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR HOUSE BILL NO. 55

(An Act making appropriations for the operating and loan program expenses of state government and to capitalize funds; and providing for an effective date.)

Chapter No. 65, SLA 1993

The Fiscal Year 1994 operating budget has been signed into law without veto or reduction of the appropriations, other than vetoes that were necessary because the underlying bills will not become law as a result of the 1993 session. While some Alaskans will be disappointed I did not exercise the Governor's power to further reduce the budget, it is important to note:

- \* The Fiscal Year 1994 general fund budget for agency operations has been reduced 4.2 percent. When you add inflation to the cost of providing services, agencies have been reduced nearly 8 percent.
- \* The growth in the Fiscal Year 1994 budget for formula-driven programs has been held to 3.7 percent.

The challenge to state agencies will be to continue providing Alaskans with the quality and level of services they have come to expect—but with less dollars to pay for them. At the same time, it is important Alaskans realize less is being spent on government. This continues the trend I began when I came into office. From Fiscal Year 1991 to Fiscal Year 1994, the operating budget has been reduced nearly 13 percent in real dollars.

One of the greatest contributions of this legislative session is slowing the runaway growth of the operating budget's formula-driven programs. For too long, these programs have been considered off limits and little effort has been made to control these automatic year-to-year increases. But this session, the Legislature stepped up to the plate. It made tough choices. It made the kind of landmark decisions in passing legislation I introduced that will have tremendous long-term impact. I applaud them for their courage.

SENATE COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR HOUSE BILL NO. 45 (FIN)

An Act making appropriations to the Department of Education for support of kindergarten, primary, and secondary education and community schools programs and for school construction debt retirement; and providing for an effective date.

Chapter No. 5, SLA 1993

In signing this bill, I am recommending that the Legislature take immediate action to pass legislation to fully fund all single site school districts for the next academic year. Additionally, I recommend that the Legislature put aside politics and get serious about my school foundation bill. Passage of my bill would provide a long-term fix to the single site problem as well as take care of the greater problem of providing fairness in the distribution of the state's revenues among our 54 school districts. Our schools and our children deserve no less.

With my aforementioned concerns aside, I am pleased with the timely manner in which school funding was addressed. Early funding gives our schools more time to make plans for the next academic year, an important ingredient for success. In some ways, this legislation speaks highly of our commitment to public schools and our children-our investment in the future. We are providing more funding than ever before for our schools. We are fully funding school operations, including the day-to-day instruction and administration, pupil transportation, and school construction debt retirement, and we are boldly meeting the responsibility of paying the added costs of an increasing enrollment. This bill reflects the commitment of our state and its citizens toward its schools and the seriousness with which we take our constitutional responsibility to maintain a system of public schools open to all of our children.

On this date I have signed the following bill with line item vetoes and am transmitting the engrossed and enrolled copies to the Lieutenant Governor's Office for permanent filing:

# HOUSE COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE BILL NO. 60 (FIN) am H

"An Act making appropriations for school construction projects and making an appropriation of \$1,066,280 from the general fund to the Department of Education for payment as grants for additional district support for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1994; and providing for an effective date."

Chapter No. 83, SLA 1993

There is no greater commitment a state and its people can share than their dedication to its future. This legislation is a landmark in showing the priority we all share in ensuring our young Alaskans have safe and adequate schools in their future.

This legislation is the first appropriation from the educational facilities maintenance and construction fund established by the Eighteenth State Legislature. It took courage for the Legislature to recognize the previous education funding program was not effective in meeting the housing and maintenance needs of our K-12 schools. The Legislature not only met this challenge by establishing a new program and appropriating necessary construction funding, but it has also put in place a program that will help stimulate our economy for several years by providing needed jobs for Alaskans. I congratulate the Legislature and am proud to sign most of this bill's appropriations into law. As passed by the Legislature, the bill appropriated \$173,235,574 for K-12 schools. It also includes

\$20,239,600 for the University of Alaska that will begin finally to meet its dramatic maintenance backlog. I am, however, vetoing two items from the bill, reducing K-12 total appropriation to \$169,866,000:

## Pedro Bay School Replacement \$2,303,294

While I appreciate local legislative interest in replacing this school, I have vetoed the project's funding. This was not an easy decision. My first concern was to ensure that the school's children were safe from serious site contamination. The Department of Environmental Conservation's evaluation finds the school's contamination is a lower priority when compared to other priorities around the state. Given it appears the children's health is not in jeopardy, I looked to the priority local officials placed on replacing the school. Local borough officials indicated the new school is not one of their priorities nor was it included in the local school district's six-year plan submitted to the Department of Education.

While these facts alone represent a solid case for my veto, my overriding concern is that when it comes to meeting the education needs of our children, Alaska must get the process away from power politics. Clear priorities based on need—and not power—must be the basis for these important funding decisions. For all of these reasons, I have vetoed this appropriation. The funding will remain in the fund and continue to be available for schools in which a higher need exists.

## Additional District Support \$1,066,280

Section 4 of the legislation appropriated additional funding for nine single-site school districts. Its enactment was contingent upon the Eighteenth Legislature's failure to pass another appropriation for this same purpose. Because the FY 94 operating budget (Chapter 65, SLA 93) includes this same appropriation per the Legislature's intent, I have vetoed this section.

My commitment to the future of our children does not end with the signing of this legislation. I look forward to working with the Legislature and school districts throughout our great state in making further investment in our future.

Turpin; and providing for an effective date.

\* Section 1. LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS AND PURPOSES. The legislature finds that

(1) As a result of the judgments entered by the United States District Court in the criminal cases United States of America v. Exxon Shipping Company and Exxon Corporation, No. A90-015 CR, the State of Alaska received \$50,000,000 in restitution "to be used by the State of Alaska ... exclusively for restoration projects, within the State of Alaska, relating to the 'Exxon Valdez' oil spill." The judgments define restoration as including "restoration, replacement, and enhancement of affected resources; acquisition of equivalent

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- resources and services; and long-term environmental monitoring and research programs directed to the prevention, containment, cleanup, and amelioration of oil spills." The money received by the state in restitution is held in the Exxon Valdez oil spill restoration fund, established by the Department of Revenue, to implement the terms of those judgments.
- (2) As a result of the Agreement and Consent Decree entered by the United States District Court in State of Alaska v. Exxon Corporation and Exxon Shipping Company, No. A91-083 CIV and the Memorandum of Agreement and Consent Decree entered by the United States District Court in United States of America v. State of Alaska, No. A91-081 CIV, the State of Alaska is entitled to receive reimbursements, paid into the state's general fund, for certain expenditures made by the state from the general fund in responding to the oil spill. It is the intent of the legislature that such money received during fiscal year 1994 be used for projects that enhance the ability of the state and the oil industry to respond to marine oil spills in the area affected by the Exxon Valdez oil spill.
- (3) The appropriations in secs. 2 13 of this Act are made in order to achieve the purposes described in the court's restitution order and to carry out the legislature's intent with regard to fiscal year 1994 reimbursements to the general fund under the Exxon settlement.
- \* Sec. 2. The sum of \$12,500,000 is appropriated from the Exxon Valdez oil spill restoration fund, described in sec. 1(1) of this Act, to the Department of Administration for payment as a grant under AS 37.05.315 to the City of Seward for development of the Alaska Sea Life Center as a recreation and marine mammal rehabilitation center and as a center for education and research related to the natural resources injured by the Exxon Valdez oil spill and to the prevention and amclioration of marine oil spills. The appropriation made by this section may be used for planning, design, engineering, and construction of the facility. Until, however, the grantee has provided to the Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority a financial plan and a feasibility study demonstrating the financial viability of the proposed center and the Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority has approved the project plan and has found the center to be financially viable, no money from this appropriation may be expended. In addition, no money from this appropriation may be expended for any phase of construction until all financing necessary to complete construction of the entire stand-alone facility has been obtained. Not more than \$4,000,000 may be expended from this

appropriation for design of the center.

- \* Sec. 3. The sum of \$7,000,000 is appropriated from the Exxon Valdez oil spill restoration fund, described in sec. 1(1) of this Act, to the Department of Natural Resources for the purchase, for \$22,000,000, of the property rights of the Seldovia Native Association, Cook Inlet Region, Inc., and Timber Trading Company, Inc. within the Kachemak Bay State Park as identified in the Agreement For Sale and Purchase of Lands and Interests Within Kachemak Bay State Park entered into in March 1993 between the state, the Seldovia Native Association, Cook Inlet Region, Inc. and Timber Trading Company.
  - \* Sec. 4. The sum of \$500,000 is appropriated from the Exxon Valdez oil spill restoration fund, described in sec. 1(1) of this Act, to the Department of Natural Resources for construction of a Kachemak Bay State Park visitors center and related facilities.
  - \* Sec. 5. The sum of \$3,250,000 is appropriated from the Exxon Valdez oil spill restoration fund, described in sec. 1(1) of this Act, to the Department of Fish and Game to aid in the restoration of subsistence resources or services, lost or diminished as a result of the Exxon Valdez oil spill, including the development of a shellfish hatchery and technical center to be located on the lower Kenai Peninsula, at a location considered appropriate by the Department of Fish and Game, and through shellfish nursery research at existing aquatic farms or other facilities in Kachemak Bay. The appropriation made by this section may be used for feasibility studies, design and engineering work, and construction of the facility, on the condition that no money may be expended for design and engineering work or construction until the Department of Fish and Game has completed a feasibility study, including a financial and operating plan.
- \* Sec. 6. The sum of \$4,000,000 is appropriated from the Exxon Valdez oil spill restoration fund, described in sec. 1(1) of this Act, to the Department of Fish and Game to enhance sport fishing services lost or diminished as a result of the Exxon Valdez oil spill, including the construction of a water delivery system connecting the Anchorage Municipal Water Utility with the Fort Richardson hatchery and the integration of that system with the hatchery and the development of a salmon production capacity model for Upper Cook Inlet drainages.
- \* Sec. 7. The sum of \$4,750,000 and the interest accrued before July 1, 1994, on the restitution payment described in sec. 1(1) of this Act, is appropriated from the Exxon Valdez

- oil spill restoration fund, described in sec. 1(1) of this Act, to the Department of Natural Resources for the construction or placement, within Prince William Sound, the southern Kenai Peninsula, and the coastal areas of the Kodiak Archipelago, of recreational amenities, including recreational cabins, trails, mooring buoys, floating docks and similar items, and the acquisition of sites and access rights for such amenities, that restore or enhance recreational services lost or diminished by the Exxon Valdez oil spill.
- \* Sec. 8. The sum of \$3,000,000 is appropriated from the Exxon Valdez oil spill restoration fund, described in sec. 1(1) of this Act, to the Department of Fish and Game for habitat restoration and enhancement projects, including the acquisition of development rights or conservation easements in aquatic, wetland, and riparian areas, within the Kenai River watershed related to the maintenance of commercial and sport fish species, and the services they provide, that were injured or lost as a result of the Exxon Valdez oil spill.
- \* Sec. 9. The sum of \$2,000,000 is appropriated from the Exxon Valdez oil spill restoration fund, described in sec. 1(1) of this Act, to the Department of Commerce and Economic Development for payment as a grant under AS 37.05.316 to the Prince William Sound Aquaculture Corporation for upgrade of the Main Bay Hatchery.
- \* Sec. 10. The sum of \$3,000,000 is appropriated from the Exxon Valdez oil spill restoration fund, described in sec. 1(1) of this Act, to the University of Alaska, Fairbanks, Fishery Industrial Technology Center for design and engineering work and construction of an addition to the existing fishery technology and research facility, to enable that facility to engage in long-term environmental monitoring and restoration work in the area affected by the Exxon Valdez oil spill, on the condition that no money may be expended for design and engineering work or construction until the University has provided, and the governor has approved, a financial plan and feasibility study.
- \* Sec. 11. (a) The sum of \$5,000,000 is appropriated from the Exxon Valdez oil spill restoration fund, described in sec. 1(1) of this Act, to the Department of Community and Regional Affairs for payment as grants under AS 44.47.050 to unincorporated rural communities for purposes of restoring, replacing, or enhancing subsistence resources or services damaged or lost as a result of the Exxon Valdez oil spill.
- (b) It is the intent of the legislature that selection of the grant recipients shall be made after consultation with the state trustees, as defined in AS 37.14.450(2).

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\* Sec. 12. The sum of \$5,000,000 is appropriated from the Exxon Valdez oil spill restoration fund, described in sec. 1(1) of this Act, to the Department of Environmental Conservation to enter into conspetitively awarded contracts with public or private entities for research programs directed to the prevention, containment, cleanup, and amelioration of oil spills within the state.

\* Sec. 13. (a) Subject to the conditions set out in (b) of this section, the sum of \$15,000,000 is appropriated from the fiscal year 1994 general fund Exxon Valdez reimbursement payments to the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities for the design and engineering work and construction of a road connecting the Seward Highway and the Port of Whittier.

(b) The first \$15,000,000 received by the state as fiscal year 1994 general fund Exxon Valdez reimbursement payments is allocated to the project described in (a) of this section.

\* Sec. 14. The sum of \$18,325,000 is appropriated from the general fund to the municipal capital project matching grant fund (AS 37.06.010(b)) in the Department of Administration to provide grants to municipalities under the municipal capital project matching grant program.

\* Sec. 15. The sum of \$1,675,000 is appropriated from the general fund to the unincorporated community capital project matching grant fund (AS 37.06.020(b)) in the Department of Community and Regional Affairs to provide grants to unincorporated communities under the unincorporated community capital project matching grant program.

\* Sec. 16. The sum of \$400,000 is appropriated from the general fund to the Department of Administration for payment as a grant under AS 37.05.315 to the City of Kenai for construction cost overruns on the state courthouse located in the City of Kenai.

On this date I have signed the following bill with line item vetoes and reductions, and am transmitting the engrossed and enrolled copies to the Lieutenant Governor's Office for permanent filing:

# HOUSE COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE BILL NO. 183 (FIN)

"An Act making special appropriations for restoration projects relating to the Exxon Valdez oil spill and for oil spill response projects; making appropriations for capital project matching grant funds; making appropriations for capital projects; making an appropriation to pay judgment, interest, and attorney fees for Frontier Flying Service v. Turpin; and providing for an effective date."

Chapter No. 79, SLA 1993

The Fiscal Year 1994 capital budget passed by the Legislature funds many diverse projects important in the everyday lives of Alaskans. These range from providing safe water and sewer systems and building infrastructure important in the economic future of communities, to improving local senior centers. After a careful review of these projects, I have vetoed \$10,185,200; of this amount, \$8,185,200 are general funds.

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Of special note is the \$20 million in funding for the first year of the capital matching grants program, one of my administration's highest priorities. I have always believed people at the local level know best what projects and programs their community needs. This is the underlying principle on which the capital matching grants program is based.

The ability to get state funds to meet local needs should not hinge on whether a community's legislator is in a powerful position. My first year as Governor I pledged to change this process and we have come a long way. When it comes to political spending in the capital budget, it is no longer business as usual: my first year the Legislature spent \$160 million in "discretionary" funding; my second year \$100 million; and this year it will be \$80 million. Next year my goal is to build on this progress and get the capital budget process even further away from one governed by political rewards. Instead, I will do all I can to put more dollars into the capital matching grants program so local communities can make these important decisions.

The following addresses several of the vetoes and reductions I have made in the capital budget:

Business Industrial Development Corporation Capitalization (BIDCO)
Funding was reduced to \$1 million from \$3 million in Science and
Technology Endowment earnings. This action does not reflect my lack of
support for the BIDCO program. Instead, it is the result of a careful review
of projected earnings which shows insufficient earnings to support the
original appropriation level. For the Fiscal Year 1995 capital budget, I will
reassess projected earnings and appropriations and consider a request for
further funding for the BIDCO program.

#### Mineral Lease Appraisal. Goodnews Bay \$100,000

This appropriation may be viewed as the first step toward encouraging a state buy-out of offshore prospecting permits issued for exploration of tracts of submerged land in the area adjacent to Goodnews Bay. Because the concept of buying out properly granted prospecting rights is not good public policy, and is not in the state's interest, I vetoed this item.

Lower Kuskokwim School District, Subsurface Water Treatment \$4,716,000 Given the priority this Administration places on meeting the water and sewer needs of rural Alaska, this veto was a difficult decision. Many water and sewer appropriations for projects in smaller communities are the responsibility of the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC). DEC has done a commendable job in developing systems that not only meet a community's needs, but systems the residents can afford to operate and maintain. Often this involves a delicate process of balancing the needs of all users in a community—whether it be the residents, businesses or a school district.

This last point was of special concern with this appropriation. The funds were appropriated to the school district and not DEC. I was concerned this balance of user needs would not take place, and as a result, I made the difficult decision to veto the funds. I have asked DEC to continue to work closely with these communities and the school district in the hope of ensuring coordinated solutions.

#### Mental Health Beneficiaries Grants

I vetoed a series of appropriations and allocations the Legislature designated to specific programs that provide services to beneficiaries of the mental health trust. Once again, this action was not due to a lack of support for these projects or the good work these programs do. Instead, it reflects my continued belief that whenever possible, funding decisions should be the result of a selection criteria based on a project's merit, and not a process based on politics (I made a similar veto in last year's capital budget). The Fiscal Year 1994 capital budget includes over \$5.5 million for competitively awarded grants to programs for projects such as those vetoed. A systematic grant process is a better process, and I anticipate many of these same projects will meet the program's criteria and will ultimately be funded.

Yakutat Wastewater and Water System Design and Construction \$899,800 I have reduced funding for this project by 50 percent, to \$499,900. Yakutat formed a home rule borough in September 1992. As a result, the

community's new status makes it ineligible for a grant under the statutory criteria of the Village Safe Water program. Instead, water and sewer project funding is subject to the provisions of the Department of Environmental Conservation's 50 percent municipal matching grants program. Accordingly, I reduced this appropriation to the 50 percent level.

Section 21 of the legislation appropriated the \$80 million in the Legislature's discretionary spending. In reviewing these projects, I was pleased with the increased emphasis communities and organizations have placed on sharing in a project's cost. In spite of this trend, I found a few projects to be lower in priority for state dollars or that other programs exist through which funding is likely to be made available.

# O'Malley Golf Course Pathway Construction and Preventive Maintenance \$70.100

While I appreciate the enjoyment playing golf may bring, I had to draw the line at what is a state responsibility--paths for golf carts is not one of them.

#### Mid-Town Recreation Center Design \$250,000

In reviewing projects such as this, I looked to the probability construction dollars would be available after the project was designed. While a neighborhood recreation center may be popular with local residents, I found no indication the community would be able to provide construction funding. In addition, another recreation center is within blocks of the new center's proposed location.

# University of Alaska, Fairbanks, Develop Virus Free Potatoes for Export \$151.600

Over the years the capital budget has financed many good ideas and this project may certainly be another one which merits state support. However, more recently the Legislature has established an endowment to provide funding to support research such as this which has marketing potential. With many needs competing for limited state dollars, it is important the capital budget process not be used to circumvent programs designed to ensure a return on the state's investment.

### <u>Valdez Fisheries Development Association, Salmon Behavior Studies</u> \$90,000

As with the above project, it is important to first maximize other fund sources that may be available. It is my understanding this project is similar in nature to work the Trustee Council funds from the Exxon Valdez civil settlement, and I encourage the organization to apply to the council.

On this date I have signed, with line item vetoes (and reductions), the following bill and am transmitting the engrossed and enrolled copies to the Lieutenant Governor's Office for permanent filing:

## CONFERENCE COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE BILL NO. 165

An Act making appropriation to the Alyeska Settlement Fund and making appropriations from the Alyeska Settlement Fund; making, amending, and repealing operating and capital appropriations; and providing for an effective date.

Chapter No. 41, SLA 1993

I approved funding for nearly all of the appropriations in this legislation. The fiscal year 1993 supplemental appropriations are less than \$40 million, an amount far less than the levels required in recent years. I commend the departments and Legislature for keeping current year expenditures in check.

The three vetoes I have made are:

<u>Section 56</u>. This section repealed a 1992 appropriation of federal funding for the upgrade of Fireweed Lane in Anchorage. The project has been designed and construction is set for this fall. Should the project have been halted now, it would have required the repayment of \$400,000 to the federal government. The project has the support of the Municipality of Anchorage and accordingly, I have vetoed the repeal of the project's funding;

<u>Section 68</u>: Funding from two of this section's prior year appropriations is unavailable. As a result, only \$136,000 is available. Accordingly, I have vetoed the \$50,000 to the Alaska Energy Authority for the Snettisham Acquisition. This action will enable all of the available funding to go to construction of the Gambell school water line. Other funding for the Snettisham acquisition is provided in section 150; and

Section 147: This section duplicates the reappropriation in section 31.

The department may make grants from the Southeast energy fund to utilities participating in the power transmission intertie between the Swan Lake and Tyee Lake hydroelectric projects for power projects, for repayment of loans, and for payments on bonds.

Sec. 42.45.050. FOUR DAM POOL TRANSFER FUND. (a) The four dam pool transfer fund is established in the department. The fund consists of repayments of principal and income that would have been deposited in the former power development revolving loan fund under former AS 44.83.500.

- (b) Subject to appropriation, the department shall transfer the balance of the four dam pool transfer fund each month in accordance with this subsection. Subject to appropriation

The connection fee for each residential or commercial structure shall conform to the line extension policy of the utility.
- (d) The department shall adopt regulations under AS 44.62 (Administrative Procedure Act) to implement this section.
- (e) In this section, "certificated" means holding a certificate of public convenience and necessity issued by the Alaska Public Utilities Commission under

ARTICLE 4. BULK FUEL REVOLVING LOAN FUND.

Sec. 42.45.250. BULK FUEL REVOLVING LOAN FUND. (a) The bulk fuel

revolving loan fund is established in the department to assist communities in
purchasing bulk fuel. A community, or a private individual who has written
endorsement from the governing body of the community, is eligible for a loan from

  - (1) may not exceed \$100,000;
  - (2) shall be repaid in one year or less; and
- (3) may not exceed 90 percent of the wholesale price of the fuel purchased.
- (f) Interest may be charged on a loan made from the bulk fuel revolving loan fund. Interest shall be charged on a loan at a rate equal to the percentage of the average weekly yield of municipal bonds for the 12 months preceding the date of the loan, as determined by the department from municipal bond yield rates reported in the 30-year revenue index of the Weekly Bond Buyer. However, if the department finds that a community cannot afford to repay a portion of interest on a loan, and makes a determination in writing, the department may reduce or eliminate the interest rate applicable to the loan.
- (g) Repayments of the principal, the interest, and the money chargeable to principal or interest that is collected through liquidation by foreclosure or other process on a loan made under this section shall be paid into the bulk fuel revolving loan fund. The fund is not a dedicated fund.

- \* Sec. 29. The Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority may issue bonds to finance the acquisition, design, and construction of a power transmission intertie of at least 138 kilovolts between Healy and Fairbanks and owned, for the benefit of all of the utilities participating in the intertie, by Golden Valley Electric Association, Inc. The principal amount of the bonds may not exceed \$60,000,000.
- \* Sec. 30. The Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority may issue bonds to finance the acquisition, design, and construction of a power transmission intertie of at least 138 kilovolts between Anchorage and the Kenai Peninsula to be owned, for the benefit of all of the utilities participating in the interties, by Chugach Electric Association, Inc. The principal amount of the bonds may not exceed \$60,000,000.
- \* Sec. 31. The Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority may issue bonds to finance the acquisition, design, and construction of a power transmission intertie of at least 115 kilovolts between the Swan Lake and Tyee Lake hydroelectric projects and owned, for the benefit of all of the utilities participating in the intertie, by Ketchikan Public Utilities. The principal amount of the bonds may not exceed \$40,000,000.
- \* Sec. 32. The Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority may issue bonds to finance the acquisition, design, and construction of a power transmission intertie of at least 138 kilovolts between Sutton and Glennallen and owned, for the benefit of all of the utilities participating in the intertie, by Copper Valley Electric Association. The principal amount of the bonds may not exceed \$25,000,000.
- \* Sec. 33. APPLICABILITY. The repeal of statutes by sec. 28 of this Act does not affect existing bonds or actions that have been taken under the repealed provisions.
- \* Sec. 34. TRANSITION. All litigation, hearings, investigations, and other proceedings pending under a law amended or repealed by this Act, or in connection with functions transferred by this Act, continue in effect and may be continued and completed by the Alaska Energy Authority or the Department of Community and Regional Affairs, as appropriate, notwithstanding a transfer or amendment or repeal provided for in this Act. Certificates,

orders, and regulations issued or adopted under authority of a law amended or repealed by this Act remain in effect for the term issued, or until revoked, vacated, or otherwise modified under the provisions of this Act. All contracts, rights, liabilities, bonds, notes, or other obligations created by or under a law amended or repealed by this Act, and in effect on the effective date of this Act remain in effect notwithstanding this Act's taking effect. The Department of Community and Regional Affairs shall assume, for those programs and projects transferred to it, the licenses, contracts, rights, liabilities, notes, or other obligations of the former Alaska Energy Authority with the same limitations and provisions as under a license, contract, right, liability, note, or other obligation of the former Alaska Energy Authority. Real property, records, equipment, and other property of the Alaska Energy Authority related to the programs and projects transferred to the department shall be transferred to the Department of Community and Regional Affairs.

\* Sec. 35. TRANSITIONAL PROVISION CONCERNING EMPLOYEES OF THE ALASKA ENERGY AUTHORITY. When the Department of Community and Regional Affairs determines that continued employment of certain employees of the Alaska Energy Authority is necessary to continue uninterrupted service to programs, facilities, and power projects formerly owned by the Alaska Energy Authority that have been transferred to the department under this Act, the department may continue the employment of those employees.

- \*Sec. 36. INITIAL TERMS OF LOAN COMMITTEE. Notwithstanding AS 42.45.060(b), enacted by sec. 5 of this Act, the initial terms of two of the public members of the loan committee established under AS 42.45.060 shall be for two years. The remaining two public members shall serve four-year terms as provided in AS 42.45.060.
- \* Sec. 37. CONTRACTS WITH PRIVATE SECTOR. The Alaska Energy Authority shall, to the maximum extent feasible, enter into contracts with public utilities and other entities to carry out its duties with respect to the maintenance and operation of power projects owned by the Alaska Energy Authority.
- \* Sec. 38. ORDERLY TRANSFER OF FUNCTIONS. (a) Notwithstanding the effective date of this Act, the governor, the Department of Community and Regional Affairs, the Alaska Energy Authority, and the office of management and budget shall implement this Act in an orderly fashion. The transfer of rural programs operated by the Alaska Energy Authority to the Department of Community and Regional Affairs must be completed no later than

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- December 31, 1993. Until a program is transferred under this section, the Alaska Energy Authority may continue to administer that program under the former provisions of AS 44.83, notwithstanding the repeal of provisions of AS 44.83 in sec. 28 of this Act.
- (b) The Alaska Energy Authority shall assist the members of the Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority to prepare for the powers and duties granted to them under this Act.
- \* Sec. 39. In accordance with AS 01.10.030, if a provision of this Act, or the application of a provision of this Act to a person or circumstance, is held invalid, the remainder of this Act and the application to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.
